2. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

On a motion by Jacob Francisco and a second by Dennis Elliott, the STA BAC unanimously approved the agenda. (9 Ayes)

3. OPPORTUNITY FOR PUBLIC & STAFF COMMENT

A. Completion of Top Ten Bike Rides, Vol. 2 North Eastern Solano County Brochure

Dulce Jimenez presented the completed Top Ten Bike Rides, Vol. 2 North Eastern Solano County Brochure, in which hard copies of the brochure were mailed out to all the BAC prior to the meeting. She concluded her presentation by thanking the committee for their support and noted that the new brochures will be part of the marketing materials printed for May 2026 Bike Month.

Summary of BAC Members Comments

- Chair Belef shared that the matte finish is preferred over a glossy finish, since it makes it easier to read the brochures.
- Nancy Lund suggested taking out “Vol. 2” and just leaving the title as “Top 10 Bike Rides, North Eastern Solano County.” This change will be applied to the brochure.

B. Planning for Community Biking Events for May 2026 Bike Month

Amy Antunano shared that the goal for 2026 Bike Month is to have a bike workshop in every city, and she requested recommendations from the BAC for ideal local spots for each city's bike workshops.

Summary of BAC Members Comments

- Chair Belef emphasized that the community bike workshops ideally should not have conflicting dates with other counties’ bike festivals so the public can participate in both. He also shared that the bike event for Vallejo could be coordinated with the Farmers Market and has connections to potentially close an entire street in downtown Vallejo. Chair Belef also discussed the accessibility of properties owned by the Greater Vallejo Recreation District. Lastly, he encouraged involving the 2 Plus 2 Committee for Vallejo several months before to get it on their radar.
- Nancy Lund noted that hosting the bike workshop at the Benicia Unified School District would be a great idea to encourage more public participation.
- Dennis Elliott asked if someone in the SR2S team would be able to join a Rio Vista Meeting, a Rotary meeting, or a 2 Plus 2 Committee to bring in the school district for Rio Vista’s bike workshop.
- Neal Iverson shared that the Vacaville bike workshop should be done in coordination with the schools and recommended working with the larger neighborhood schools like Browns Valley Elementary School or Jean Callison Elementary School. In addition, he mentioned Fiesta Days was a big event the STA staff could potentially table.
- Chair Belef suggested the idea of reviving a bike film festival. Another suggestion included having a portable screen and showing bike-related films that workshop participants may be able to see as they attend the community events.

He showcased pictures of all the new wayfinding signs along with the two new interpretative panels that were placed at both ends of the Benicia-Martinez Bridge.

B. Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP) Updates

Dulce Jimenez provided an update on the CTP community outreach results for the Active Transportation Element.

Chair Belef encouraged the BAC Members to spread the word about STA plan-related surveys so more members of the public can share their feedback, as each person's experience is valuable.

C. Update to the Joint BAC/PAC Ad-Hoc Committee for E-Mobility Safety

Dennis Elliott reported that data for injuries associated with electrified means of transportation, like e-bikes or e-scooters, are not being tracked and noted that there will be upcoming legislation in 2026 that may help with reporting and tracking e-mobility incidents. He further commented that the California State Senate passed Senate Bill 381, which calls for research to help policymakers develop effective laws and policies that support expanded electric e-bike use in a way that protects the safety of both e-bike riders and other road users.

Dulce Jimenez announced that, going forward, the STA Safe Routes to School (SR2S) Program will take the lead in any future e-mobility discussions, pausing the Joint BAC/PAC Ad-Hoc Committee until further notice.

Background:

The Solano Transportation Authority's (STA) Comprehensive Transportation Plan (CTP) serves as the primary long-range planning document that guides and prioritizes the STA's investments in transportation. It also serves as the foundational document from which transportation projects and programs are considered for the Metropolitan Transportation Commission's (MTC) Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), called Plan Bay Area (PBA).

One of the primary purposes of the CTP is to identify a list of priority transportation projects and programs from the seven Solano cities and the County of Solano that will be eligible for STA's discretionary funds (e.g. One Bay Area Grant (OBAG), Transportation Development Act (TDA) and Bay Area Air District Transportation Fund for Clean Air (TFCA) 40% Funds Program) as well as STA staff support. The intent is to submit the list of projects and programs from the CTP Update for inclusion in MTC's updated RTP. Doing so will make the identified Solano projects and programs eligible for current and future regional, state, and federal funding.

Discussion:

During Fall 2025, STA staff commenced evaluating member agency projects submitted for all three CTP elements, utilizing the Board-approved Project Prioritization Criteria to categorize projects and programs into priority tiers. These criteria are directly aligned with the Goals and Objectives recently adopted for the three CTP Elements. The CTP Update Project Prioritization Criteria can be found in Attachment A.

The first round of project evaluations focused on active transportation projects, with particular emphasis placed on the Project Readiness criterion. Projects that had completed key phases—such as environmental review and design—received higher scores in this category, whereas projects that had not yet advanced into the PA&E phase scored lower.

Following the initial scoring of the active transportation projects, STA staff used the results to organize the projects into three primary tiers. Tier I projects are actively progressing toward shovel-ready status and are expected to move into construction as soon as funding becomes available. Tier II projects have initiated key phases of development; however, substantial work remains before they can be considered shovel-ready. Tier III projects are anticipated to have a longer timeline before construction and, as a result, have not yet begun significant advancement.

The draft tiered list of active transportation projects is provided in Attachment B. The list also illustrates how each project performed under each evaluation criterion, represented using three colors: green for strong performance, yellow for lower performance, and gray for minimal or no points awarded.

The STA Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) received a presentation on this agenda item at their December 17, 2025, meeting, in which their review and feedback were requested. Feedback that was submitted by the TAC has been incorporated into the attached draft project list, which will also be presented to the January 14, 2026, Active Transportation Committee (ATC).

Role of the BAC:

Following the January ATC committee meeting, a public comment period will be initiated, during which revisions to the list may be considered. STA staff encourage the BAC to work with their respective public works staff to review the draft tiered active transportation project list. Proposed revisions to the list will need to be submitted to STA staff by the respective public works staff. The BAC may also be able to submit comments on the project list; the comments will be collected and forwarded to the respective public works staff for their review and consideration.

Looking ahead:

STA staff anticipate bringing a final draft of the tiered active transportation project list to the STA TAC at its April 29, 2026, meeting, with the intention to bring a final draft list to the ATC at the May 13, 2026, meeting for review and recommendation to the STA Board.

Background:

The Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC) serves to advise the STA Board on planning, funding, and implementation of countywide bicycle-related projects, facilities, and programs.

Each calendar year, STA staff work with the BAC to create a calendar year work plan that will guide the agendas and work products for the BAC to anticipate for the upcoming year.

In 2025, the BAC was essential in coordinating with STA staff to prioritize projects to allocate \$532,820 in Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-25 Transportation Development Act Article 3 (TDA-3) funds.

Discussion:

The 2026 Draft BAC Work Plan focuses on five (5) main goals for the BAC to focus on in 2026:

RECRUIT REPRESENTATIVES FOR BICYCLE ADVISORY COMMITTEE: Support in the recruitment of any vacant positions on the BAC. The goal of the BAC is to have full representation from all eight Solano jurisdictions. STA staff will provide relevant and appropriate enrichment materials for a fully engaged BAC.

PRIORITIZE FUNDING: Discuss and provide constructive feedback on proposed active transportation projects put forth by the STA and/or City/County staff. Support STA staff and/or City/County staff in their pursuit of active transportation grant opportunities for projects identified in the 2020 Active Transportation Plan and upcoming Comprehensive Transportation Plan.

ADVOCATE FOR BICYCLE IMPROVEMENTS IN THE EIGHT SOLANO
