RE: Executive Director's Report – January 2026

The following is a brief status report on some of the major issues, plans, projects, and programs currently being advanced by the Solano Transportation Authority (STA). An asterisk (*) notes items included in this month's Board agenda.

Legislative Update and Adoption of Legislative Platform and Priorities for 2026*

State legislative and management staff have prepared the draft Legislative Platform and Priorities in preparation for the 2026 legislative session. The draft platform was distributed for a 30 day comment period and staff did not receive any comments. The final Legislative Platform and Priorities for 2026 is scheduled to be adopted by the STA Board meeting on January 14, 2026.

STA's State Lobbyists, Matt Robinson and Michael Pimentel, are scheduled to provide updates on the State Legislature and pending legislation at the January 14, 2026 Board meeting. STA's Federal Lobbyist, Susan Lent, is scheduled to present to the STA Board in February 2026.

STA's Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR) for Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-25 – Annual Audit*

STA Finance staff has submitted the Annual Audit for FY 2024-25, which was recently completed by an independent auditing firm, Maze & Associates. The annual audit was completed without any material findings.

STA finance staff will provide the first quarter budget report for FY 2025-26 at the Board Meeting on February 11, 2026 .

Solano Express Subcommittee Recommendation*

The STA Board formed a subcommittee at the recommendation of the 2025 STA Chair Mashburn to discuss Solano Express service changes and funding. The Subcommittee has met on two occasions in the month of December 2025 and discussed a variety of issues associated with service changes being proposed by SolTrans and development of a funding agreement for FY 2026-27. At the meeting, STA staff and Subcommittee Chair will provide an overview of the meetings and a recommendation that will provide a framework and budget for the FY 2026-27 funding agreement.

Solano Mobility Programs First Quarter Report for Fiscal Year (FY) 2025-26 - Employer/Commuter Programs*

STA Solano Mobility staff has provided the FY 2025-26 first quarter report for Mobility Programs focused on addressing the mobility needs of commuters, employers and their employees.

Overall Work Plan (OWP)

STA management staff will be updating the STA's Overall Work Plan (OWP) for FY 2026-27 and FY 2027-28 and will provide an update at the February Board meeting. The OWP will guide the STA on their two year budget which will be presented at the June or July Board meeting.

Staff Update

Finance Budget Manager, Patricia McKeever departed the STA on December 31, 2025. Recruitment for her replacement is underway. Susan Furtado has been brought back until permanent replacement has been identified.

College Intern, Annalee Yun Barnard, started her internship in the Planning Department on December 17, 2025 and will be supervised by STA's Deputy Executive Director/Director of Planning, Robert Guerrero.

The BAC representatives are nominated either by their respective city council or mayor before being considered by the STA Board for a formal appointment. Member-at-large positions are appointed directly by the STA Board. Appointments are for a 3-year term and are voluntary. Non-elected citizens are encouraged to participate in these citizen advisory committees.

Discussion:

Tyler Meirose is seeking to be reappointed as the BAC representative for the City of Suisun City. Mr. Meirose has been an active participant in the BAC and has been serving as the BAC representative on the Active Transportation Committee (ATC). Mr. Meirose's reappointment as the Suisun City BAC representative was approved by the Suisun City Council at their December 2, 2025, meeting. The appointment letter is shown in Attachment B.

STA staff recommends reappointing Tyler Meirose as the BAC representative for the City of Suisun City for a three-year term set to expire on December 31, 2028.

Background:

Since 2007, the Solano Transportation Authority (STA), in partnership with the City of Vallejo and Solano County, has been working on studying improvements to the Interstate 80/Redwood Parkway and State Route 37 (SR37)/Fairgrounds Drive Interchange, as well as Fairgrounds Drive. This effort led to the Project Study Report (PSR) being completed and approved by Caltrans in 2009. The PSR recommended that improvements at each of these locations to be an independent component project.

Following the PSR, the STA entered into a Funding Agreement with Solano County and the City of Vallejo to complete the environmental documentation of the improvements. This agreement specified that the STA would be the lead agency for the California Environmental Quality Act, while Caltrans would be the lead agency for the National Environmental Protection Act. The final draft of the Environmental Impact Report/Environmental Assessment (EIR/EA) was submitted to Caltrans for approval in February 2013.

Subsequently, after receiving EIR/EA approval from Caltrans in June 2015, the STA amended its agreement with the County and City to provide additional funding needed to complete design of the improvements at the SR37/Fairgrounds Drive Interchange. The design focused on transforming the existing interchange from a tight diamond configuration to a diverging diamond interchange (DDI). The DDI design offers several benefits including a smaller construction footprint, while reducing intersection delay and increasing throughput, as well as improving pedestrian and cyclist safety.

Discussion:

The SR37/Fairgrounds Drive DDI Project is now under construction. The STA issued the award letter to the lowest bidder, Ghilotti Construction Company, in December 2024. A month later in January 2025, a notice-to-proceed letter was issued following contract approval. Thereafter, the Resident Engineer managing the construction of the project scheduled a recurring coordination meeting with the Project Management Team, which includes staff from the Vallejo Flood and Wastewater District (District).

The District's Sanitary Sewer Collection System Master Plan (SSCSMP) includes a project to enlarge the existing gravity sewer main crossing on Fairgrounds Drive, approximately 720 feet south of the Fairgrounds Drive and Sage Street intersection, in addition to upstream and downstream improvements. These improvements are critical to providing adequate sewer service for upstream development in the Sears Point Sewer Shed. Planned upstream

development is accounted for in the SSCSMP; however, two major developments, Blue Rock Springs and Scotts Valley Tribal Casino, were not included in the City's General Plan or the SSCSMP. These projects, if commenced simultaneously, may significantly impact District sewer capacity, requiring acceleration of planned future improvements.

Effective and close coordination of staff between the STA and the District has created an opportunity to construct a short segment of the District's future sewer capacity project concurrently with the DDI Project. The STA is amenable to issuing a construction change order to include the District's project in STA's roadway construction project on Fairgrounds Drive. The design and construction of the sewer capacity improvements, at the cost of the District, will be performed concurrently with roadway construction in a "dig-once" approach that minimizes public impact and District costs.

The District received approval from its Board in December 2025, as shown in Attachment A, to reimburse the STA for costs incurred related to the design and construction of the sewer capacity improvements on Fairgrounds Drive as part of the DDI Project. The terms of the reimbursement will be stated in the funding agreement that STA will need to execute with the District. This agreement will allow the STA to invoice the District for the related costs incurred.

Fiscal Impact:

None to the STA.

Recommendation:

RECOMMENDATION

Approve a new capital improvement project entitled, Fairgrounds Drive Sewer Crossing, and authorize the General Manager to execute a Funding Agreement with Solano Transportation Authority (STA) to include construction of the project with the State Route (SR 37)/Fairgrounds Drive Improvement Project.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

The STA, County of Solano, and City of Vallejo signed a Funding Agreement in December 2016 and a Restated Funding Agreement on July 27, 2021, for the SR 37/Fairgrounds Drive Improvement project. The project includes widening Fairgrounds Drive from Coach Lane to SR 37 and modifying the SR 37/Fairgrounds Drive interchange to a new diverging diamond configuration. ("Road Project"). Construction of the Road Project is currently underway, with completion expected in 2026.

The District's Sanitary Sewer Collection System Master Plan (SSCSMP) includes a project to enlarge the existing gravity sewer main crossing Fairgrounds Drive, approximately 720 feet south of the Fairgrounds Drive and Sage Street intersection, in addition to upstream and downstream improvements. These improvements are critical to providing adequate sewer service for upstream development in the Sears Point Sewer Shed. Planned upstream development is accounted for in the SSCSMP; however, two major developments, Blue Rock Springs and Scotts Valley Tribal Casino, were not included in the City's General Plan or the SSCSMP. These projects, if commenced simultaneously, may significantly impact District sewer capacity, requiring acceleration of planned future improvements.

Effective coordination between the District and the STA has created an opportunity to construct a short segment of the District's future sewer capacity project concurrently with the Road Project. The STA is amenable to a construction change order to include the District project in STA's roadway construction project. The design and construction of the sewer, at District cost, will be performed concurrently with roadway construction, at STA cost, in a "dig-once" approach that minimizes public impact and District costs. The Funding Agreement stipulates the parties' collective desire to coordinate in completing these mutually beneficial activities.

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW

The project is statutorily exempt from CEQA under Section 21080.21 of the Public Resources Code. A notice of exemption will be filed.

FISCAL IMPACT

The total project cost for this work is estimated to be between \$350,000 and \$450,000. Sufficient funding is available in the approved FY26 Capital Improvement Program budget.

This Funding Agreement (“**Agreement**”) is entered into by the Solano Transportation Authority, a joint powers authority organized under Government Code section 6500 et seq. consisting of the County of Solano and the cities of Benicia, Dixon, Fairfield, Rio Vista, Suisun, Vacaville and Vallejo (“**STA**”) and the Vallejo Flood And Wastewater District, an independent special district (“**District**”), each individually referred to as a “**Party**” and collectively as the “**Parties**” to be effective as of the last date written below.

RECITALS

The STA, County of Solano, and City of Vallejo signed a Funding Agreement in December 2016 and a Restated Funding Agreement on July 27, 2021, for the SR 37/Fairgrounds Drive Improvement project. The project includes widening Fairgrounds Drive from Coach Lane to SR 37 and modifying the SR 37/Fairgrounds Drive interchange (“**Road Project**”).

The District's Sanitary Sewer Collection System Master Plan includes a project to enlarge the existing gravity sewer main crossing Fairgrounds Drive, approximately 720 feet south of the Fairgrounds Drive and Sage Street intersection.

The Parties agree it is beneficial and in the public interest to construct the sanitary sewer crossing project (“**sewer project**”) concurrently with the road improvement project.

AGREEMENT

The Parties agree as follows:

A. STA agrees to:

1. Work collaboratively with the District to include the construction of the sewer project concurrently with the construction of the road project.
2. Approve STA’s consultant team to:
 - i. Assist in preliminary engineering investigations necessary to ascertain the constructability of the District’s preferred alternative.
 - ii. Prepare construction plans and contract documents for use by the road project’s contractor to complete the sewer project.
 - iii. Observe and support the sewer project with Construction Management personnel
 - iv. Enable District-provided inspection activities.

- v. Comply with design, construction, testing, and acceptance specifications as provided by District.
3. Prepare and execute a change order for the Road Project, approving construction of the Sewer Project.
4. Maintain itemized cost reporting for lump sum payment of expenses incurred in the delivery of the sewer project at its completion. Itemized reporting shall be made available for review by the District on a monthly basis.

B. District agrees to:

1. Provide the design specifications for the construction of the sewer project.
2. Provide construction inspection for the sewer project at District expense.
3. Manage CEQA compliance for the sewer project.
4. Pay the final invoice received from STA within 45 days.
5. Accept the final work product

C. Mutual Obligation:

The Parties agree that the District shall be invoiced directly by STA for expenses incurred in the delivery of the sewer project work.

D. Payments:

Payment shall be a lump sum from the District to STA.

E. Term and Termination:

1. This Agreement shall remain in effect through the filing of the Notice of Completion on the Project, unless it is terminated or amended earlier as provided in this Agreement.
2. Either Party may terminate its participation in the process upon written notice to the other with thirty (30)-day written notice.

F. Indemnification:

Each Party shall indemnify, defend, protect, hold harmless, and release the other, their elected bodies, officers, agents, and employees, from and against any and all claims, losses, proceedings, damages, causes of action, liability, costs, or expense (including attorneys' fees and witness costs) arising from or in connection with, or caused by any negligent act or omission or willful misconduct of such indemnifying Party. This indemnification obligation shall not be limited in any way by any limitation on the amount or type of damages or compensation payable to or for the indemnifying Party under workers' compensation acts, disability benefit acts, or other employee benefit acts.

G. Insurance:

1. Each Party agrees to maintain its status as a legally self-insured public entity for general, auto, and professional liability insurance coverage with limits of no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and no less than \$15,000,000 aggregate. Each Party's insurance will be considered primary for all claims arising out of acts of that Party. Each Party agrees to endorse the other

Party, its officials, employees and agents, using standard ISO endorsement No. CG2010 or its equivalent for general liability coverage. Each Party also agrees to require all consultant, contractors and subcontractors engaged to work on this Project to name the other Party as an additional insured as well.

2. Each Party will maintain Workers' Compensation as required by law for all its employees with limits not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence. Neither Party's insurance shall be called upon to satisfy any claim for workers' compensation filed by an employee of the other Party. Each Party will provide the other with a Waiver of Subrogation endorsement for Workers Compensation. Each Party also agrees to require all consultants, contractors and subcontractors engaged to work on this Project to carry the same Workers Compensation insurance limits and endorsements.

3. Each Party will require all consultants, contractors, and subcontractors engaged to work on this Project to carry insurance in levels commensurate with the exposure of the respective work provided by the consultant, contractor or subcontractor. of the respective work provided by the consultant, contractor or subcontractor.

H. Notices:

All notices required or authorized by this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be delivered in person or by deposit in the United States mail, by certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested. Any mailed notice, demand, request, consent, approval or communication that a Party desires to give to the other Party shall be addressed to the other Party at the addresses set forth below. A Party may change its address by notifying the other Party of the change of address. Any notice sent by mail in the manner prescribed by this Paragraph shall be deemed to have been received on the date noted on the return receipt or five days following the date of deposit, whichever is earlier.

payment for any work associated with this Agreement, or after all pending matters are closed, whichever is later.

J. Severability:

If any provision or any part of any provision of this Agreement is, for any, reason, held to be invalid, unenforceable or contrary to any public policy, law, statute, regulation or ordinance, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected by it and shall remain valid and fully enforceable.

K. Interpretation:

Each Party has reviewed this Agreement and any question of doubtful interpretation shall not be resolved by any rule or interpretation providing for interpretation against the drafting Party. This Agreement shall be construed as if all of the Parties drafted it. The captions and headings contained herein are for convenience only and shall not affect the meaning or interpretation of this Agreement.

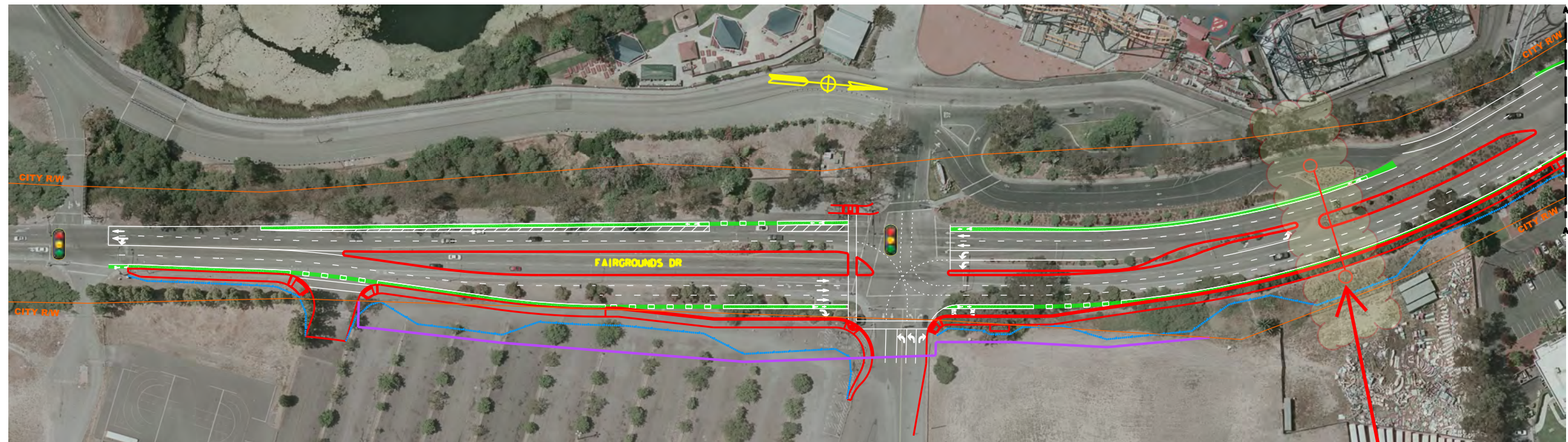

Sewer Crossing

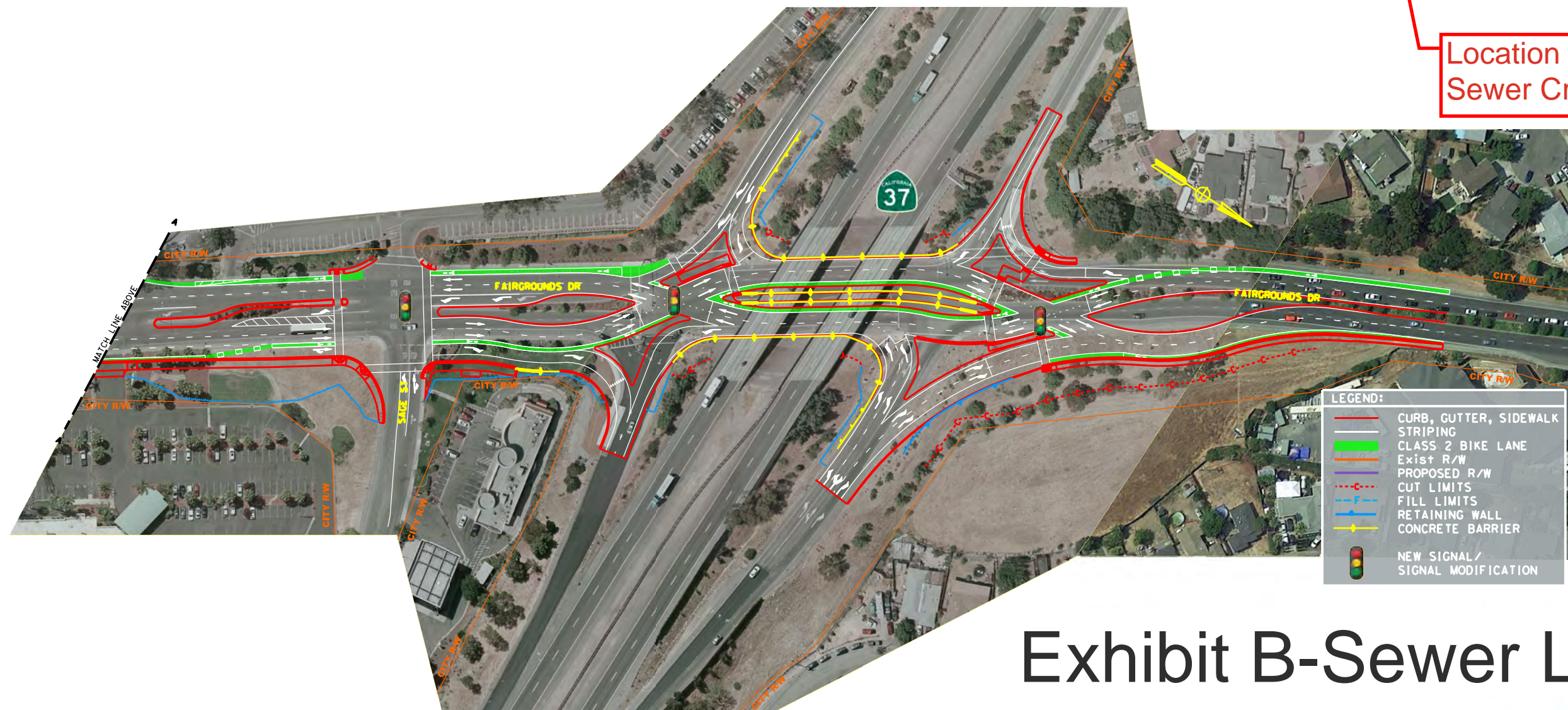


Exhibit B-Sewer Location

Each year, STA staff monitors state and federal legislation that pertains to transportation and related issues. On January 8, 2025, the STA Board approved its 2025 Legislative Platform to provide policy guidance on transportation legislation and the STA's legislative activities during 2025.

To help ensure the STA's transportation policies and priorities are consensus-based, the STA's Legislative Platform is first developed in draft form by staff with input from the STA's state (Shaw/Yoder/Antwih, Inc.) and federal (Akin Gump) legislative consultants.

Discussion:

This draft was distributed to STA member agencies and members of our federal and state legislative delegations for review and comment. Staff has not received any comments from the public to the Platform. Staff is recommending that the STA Board adopt the final draft of the 2026 Legislative Platform and Priorities. At their respective December 16th and December 17th meetings, the Consortium and TAC Committees unanimously approved staff's recommendation to forward the finalized Platform to the STA Board. Monitor and support the implementation of Metropolitan Transportation Commission's (MTC) Plan Bay Area 2050 four planning quadrants of Transportation, Housing, Environment, and Economy in coordination with STA member agencies such as Solano Economic Development Corporation, Travis Air Force Base, the Solano City County Coordinating Council (4Cs), and other partnership agencies.
14. Support implementation of the Capitol Corridor Strategic Plan and State Rail Plan, including:
 - a. Implementation of the Solano rail hub at the Suisun/Fairfield Amtrak Station
 - b. Support rail crossing safety improvements and update to the Rail Crossings Safety Improvements Plan
15. Monitor and support the California Transit Association's (CTA's) and the Metropolitan Transportation Commission's (MTC's) efforts to obtain federal and state funding for transit.
16. Monitor legislative proposals from the MTC's Blue Ribbon Transit Recovery Task Force and the Transportation Revenue Measure Select Committee recommendations and support implementation of the Six Functional Areas: Fare Integration Policy, Wayfinding & Mapping, Bus Transit Priority, Accessible Services (including Paratransit and Solano Mobility), Rail Network Management, and Connected Network Planning.
17. Support efforts to ensure Solano County receives its fair share of federal transportation funding from the state and region.
18. Support implementation of national, state, and regional freight plans that include construction of the I-80 managed lanes from Carquinez bridge to Yolo County line, I-80 Westbound Truck Scales and SR 12 East improvements, and Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) deployment, Freight Electrification, and alternative fueling and rest stations.
19. Support establishment and operation of a regional Express Lanes network by the Bay Area Infrastructure Financing Authority (BAIFA), which includes I-80 in Solano County and connects the Bay Area region to Sacramento.
20. Support "fix it first" efforts that prioritize a large portion of scarce federal and state resources on maintaining, rehabilitating, and operating Solano County's aging transportation infrastructure over expansion.

21. Monitor legislation which impacts STA's statutory authority to serve as the Countywide Transportation Planning and Congestion Management Agency (CMA) for Solano County.

I. Active Transportation/Land Use/Housing/Jobs

1. Promote, implement, and expand active transportation facilities land use planning, and programs (such as Safe Routes to School and Safe Routes to Transit) to support pedestrian, bicycle, and multimodal use in Solano County. Support legislation that prioritizes road safety for pedestrians and cyclists, particularly for vulnerable users such as children, the elderly, and the disabled.
2. Support legislation that provides adequate, dedicated funding for the development of transportation projects that support housing including affordable housing in Transit Oriented Communities (TOC) locations and Priority Development Areas (PDAs).
3. Support legislation that provides adequate, dedicated funding for the development of transportation projects that support employment and jobs including designated Priority Production Areas (PPA) in Solano County.
4. Support legislative and regulatory efforts to ensure that projects from Solano County cities are eligible for federal, state, and regional funding related to MTC's Transit Oriented Communities (TOC) policy. Monitor MTC to ensure that development projects and transit standards for MTC's TOC policy can be reasonably met in Solano County's suburban communities.
5. Recognize Solano County's housing affordability at the regional context (i.e., Solano County is the most affordable County in the Bay Area) and support funding programs that link transportation investment to STA's future Solano Housing Investment Program. (SolHIP) and Solano Suburban Housing Investment Pool (SubHIP) Program through the STA's County Collaborative on Housing.
6. Monitor legislation and oppose any caps to County Development Impact Fee, which reduces the Regional Transportation Impact Fee (RTIF) and would negatively impact the development of affordable housing in Solano County.
7. Monitor the implementation of the San Francisco Bay Area Housing Finance Authority and subsequent efforts to develop and pass a regional funding measure to support housing.

II. Climate Change/Air Quality

1. Monitor implementation of federal attainment plans for pollutants in the Bay Area and Sacramento air basins, including ozone and particulate matter attainment plans. Work with the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) and the Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG), BAAQMD, and YSAQMD to ensure consistent review of projects in the two air basins.
2. Monitor and participate in the implementation of state climate change legislation. This includes agency regulations such as the State's Climate Action Plan for Transportation Infrastructure (CAPTI), California Air Resources Board (CARB) greenhouse gas reduction target setting and the extension of the Cap-and-Trade program beyond 2030, and the Advanced Clean Cars II Regulations.

3. Continue to participate in the implementation of the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), known as Plan Bay Area 2050, including on-going funding of investment in Priority Development Areas (PDAs), Priority Conservation Areas (PCAs), and Priority Production Areas (PPAs). (Objective #13)
4. Support legislation, which ensures that any fees imposed to reduce vehicle miles traveled, or to control mobile source emissions, are used to support transportation programs that provide congestion relief, benefit air quality or support climate change adaptation.
5. Support legislation and funding, which provides infrastructure for zero emission vehicles, including the installation of more consumer level chargers, zero-emission of freight vehicles and zero-emission of SolanoExpress and all five local transit operators. =
6. Support policies that improve and streamline the environmental review process, including the establishment and use of mitigation banks and advanced mitigation programs.
7. Support legislation that allows for air emission standards appropriate for infill development linked to transit centers and/or in designated Priority Development Areas (PDA). Allow standards that tolerate higher levels of air pollutants in exchange for allowing development supported by transit that reduces greenhouse gas emissions, provided these standards are equitable.
8. Monitor energy policies and alternative fuel legislation or regulation that may affect fleet vehicle requirements for mandated use of alternative fuel.
9. Support legislation to provide funding for innovative, intelligent/advanced transportation and air quality programs, which relieve congestion, improve air quality, and enhance economic development.
10. Support TIRCP Funds that fund zero-emission transit, and overall reduction of GHG.

III. Employee Relations

1. Monitor legislation and regulations affecting labor relations, employee rights, benefits, and working conditions, including litigation and transit funding impacted by PEPRA/13(c). Preserve a balance between the needs of the employees and the resources of public employers that have a legal fiduciary responsibility to taxpayers.
2. Monitor any legislation affecting workers' compensation that impacts employee benefits, control of costs, and changes that affect self-insured employers.
3. Monitor legislation affecting the liability of public entities, particularly in personal injury or other civil wrong legal actions.

IV. Environmental

1. Monitor legislation and regulatory proposals related to management of the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta (Estuary) in the context of rising sea level and ecosystems functions, including those that would potentially impact existing and proposed transportation facilities such as State Routes 12, 84, and 113.

2. Seek funding for vulnerability assessment, adaptation and projects implementation for sea-level rise, fires, flood protection and climate change in relation to existing and proposed transportation facilities in Solano County, including State Highways, Freeways, and Routes of Regional Significance. (Objective #5)
3. Monitor proposals to designate new species as threatened or endangered under either the federal or state Endangered Species Acts. Monitor proposals to designate new “critical habitat” in areas that will impact existing and proposed transportation facilities.
4. Monitor the establishment of environmental impact mitigation banks to ensure that they do not restrict reasonably foreseeable transportation improvements (Section II Climate Change/Air Quality, #6).
5. Monitor legislation and regulations that would impose requirements on highway construction to contain stormwater runoff.
6. Advocate for regulations that increase safety pertaining to the transport of volatile and hazardous materials.
7. Monitor and support state legislation that streamlines CEQA for transit and active transportation projects, including expanding the list of statutorily exempt projects.
8. Monitor and support provisions in federal law Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA), that further streamline the environmental review and permitting process to allow projects to advance more quickly and more cost effectively.
9. Support and monitor MTC’s Climate resiliency implementation efforts and Caltrans’ Climate Action Plan for Transportation Infrastructure, including projects such as the SR 37 Corridor.

V. Water Transport

1. Protect existing sources of operating and capital support for San Francisco Bay Ferry service operated by WETA which do not jeopardize transit operating funds for SolanoExpress intercity bus operations and local transit operators. This includes additional operating funds and capital improvements for the Vallejo segment of the SF Bay Ferry.
2. Support efforts to restore the level of service directly between Vallejo and San Francisco as well as capacity improvements at the Vallejo Station that support the increased service of Ferry Operations as a result of RM3. Support efforts to reduce overall travel time between Solano County and San Francisco Ferry Terminals.
3. Support recommendations of the STA’s Water Transit Feasibility Study including water transit options between Solano, Contra Costa, Marin, and San Francisco counties where feasible.

VI. Funding

1. Work with member and partner agencies to support the implementation of SB 1 funded projects and oppose efforts to divert funds to assure a dedicated source of funding, other than the State Highway Account for local streets and roads maintenance/repairs, and transit operations.
2. Advocate for Congress to pass surface transportation legislation that provides stable and reliable funding for highway, transit and rail programs, including continued funding of competitive grant programs.
3. Advocate for supplemental funding for federal transportation grant programs in annual appropriations legislation.
4. Pursue annual state legislative funding requests for priority transportation projects from members of the State Legislature representing Solano County.
5. Pursue annual community project funding requests for priority transportation projects from members of Congress representing Solano County.
6. Support reauthorization and continued funding of discretionary programs, including but not limited to the Local and Regional Project Assistance Program, National Infrastructure Project Assistance (MEGA), the Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE), Infrastructure For Rebuilding America (INFRA), Bus and Bus Facilities, Low or No Emissions grants, Promoting Resilient Operations for Transformative Efficient and Cost Saving Transportation (PROTECT), Reconnecting Communities, Safe Streets and Roads for All, Strengthening Mobility and Revolutionizing Transportation (SMART) and Advanced Transportation Technologies & Innovative Mobility Deployment grant programs.
7. Protect Solano County's statutory portions of state highway and transit funding programs.
8. Seek a fair share for Solano County of any federal and state discretionary funding made available for transportation grants, programs, and projects.
9. Protect State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) funds from use for purposes other than those covered in SB 45 of 1997 (Chapter 622) reforming transportation planning and programming and support timely allocation of new STIP funds.
10. Support state budget and California Transportation Commission (CTC) allocation to fully fund projects for Solano County included in the State Transportation Improvement Program and the Comprehensive Transportation Plans of the county.
11. Support efforts to protect and preserve funding in the Public Transportation Account (PTA), and the efforts of the California Transit Association's Transit Transformation Task Force.
12. Support legislation that increases the overall funding levels for transportation priorities in Solano County.
13. Support legislation that encourages public-private partnerships and provides low-cost financing for transportation projects in Solano County.

14. Support legislation to secure adequate budget appropriations for highway, bus, rail, air quality, and mobility programs in Solano County.
15. Support initiatives to pursue the 55% or lower voter threshold for local transportation infrastructure measures. Any provisions of the State to require a contribution for maintenance on a project included in a local measure must have a nexus to the project being funded by the measure. (Objective #7)
16. Seek funding for movement of goods via maritime-related transportation, including the dredging of channels, port locations and freight shipment.
17. Support implementation of national, state, and regional freight plans that fund construction of the I-80 Managed Lanes, I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange, I-80 Westbound Truck Scales and SR 12 East improvements, and Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) deployment and zero-emission technology of freight. (Objective #18)
18. Support legislation that provides funding that would allocate State ATP funds at the regional and county level by formula.
19. Ensure STA population-based funds (SB 1) continue to be distributed by formula to the county transportation authorities. (Objective #1)
20. Ensure that new bridge tolls are dedicated to improving operations and mobility in Solano County. (Specifically: I-80 Express Lanes, I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange, I-80 Westbound Truck Scales, SR 37/Fairgrounds Interchange, Intercity bus and rail facilities, additional operating funds for SolanoExpress, and additional operating funds and capital improvements for the Vallejo segment of the SF Bay Ferry operated by the Water Emergency Transportation Authority (WETA). (Objective #2)
21. Oppose any proposal that could reduce Solano County's opportunity to receive transportation funds, including diversion of state transportation revenues for other purposes. Fund sources include, but are not limited to, State Highway Account (SHA), Public Transportation Account (PTA), and Transportation Development Act (TDA), SB 1, and any local ballot initiative raising transportation revenues. (Objective #6)
22. Support the Capitol Corridor Joint Powers Authority (CCJPA) to secure discretionary grants, including, but not limited to CRISI, and State of Good Repair, SOGR for rail capital projects.
23. Support the implementation of Caltrans' California State Rail Plan, which includes advancing the development of the Solano Rail Hub at the Suisun/Fairfield Amtrak Station
24. Protect construction jobs by opposing efforts to divert funding from construction to transit operations.
25. Support legislation that promotes and protects the STA's role as the Program Manager for the Bay Area Air Quality Management District's (BAAQMD) Transportation Fund for Clean Air (TFCA) program.

26. Monitor MTC's development of legislation by the Transportation Revenue Select Committee to address the region's transit operators' fiscal cliff, and oppose diversion of transit funding from Solano County operators to backfill the fiscal cliff.

VII. Project Delivery

1. Support federal and state laws and policies that expedite project delivery and enhance STA's working relationship with local, state, and federal governments.
2. Support legislation and/or administrative reforms to enhance Caltrans project delivery, such as simultaneous Environmental Impact Report (EIR) and engineering studies, design-build authority, and a reasonable level of contracting out of appropriate activities to the private sector.
3. Support legislation, regulations and policies to streamline federal application/reporting/monitoring requirements to ensure efficiency and usefulness of data collected and eliminate unnecessary and/or duplicative requirements.
4. Support legislation that encourages public private partnerships and provides streamlined and economical delivery of transportation projects in Solano County.
5. Support legislation and/or administrative reforms that require federal and state regulatory agencies to adhere to their statutory deadlines for review and/or approval of environmental documents that have statutory funding deadlines for delivery, to ensure the timely delivery of projects funded with state and/or federal funds.
6. Prevent project delivery delays by requesting Pacific Gas & Electric (PG&E) maintain customer service levels and increase wildfire prevention and hardening efforts, with more undergrounding of PG&E service lines within Solano County.

VIII. Rail

1. In partnership with other counties located along the Capitol Corridor, seek expanded state commitment for funding passenger rail service, whether state or locally administered.
2. Support legislation and/or budgetary actions to assure a fair share of State revenues of intercity rail (provided by Capitol Corridor) funding for Northern California and Solano County.
3. Support legislation to ensure that dedicated state intercity rail funding is allocated to the regions administering each portion of the system and assure that funding is distributed on an equitable basis.
4. Support implementation of the State Rail Plan, including advancing the development of the Solano Rail Hub, improvements at the Fairfield Vacaville Hannigan Rail Station, connecting the Capitol Corridor to the state high speed rail system, and exploring connection of the Sonoma Marin Area Rapid Transit (SMART) system to Solano County.
5. Support legislation and funding to adequately fund implementation of safety improvements at rail crossings, including replacement of at-grade railroad crossings with grade-separated crossings.

6. Oppose legislation that would prohibit Amtrak from providing federal funds for any state-supported Intercity Passenger Rail corridor services.

IX. Safety

1. Monitor legislation or administrative procedures to streamline the process for local agencies to receive funds for road and levee repair and other flood protection.
2. Support legislation to further fund Safe Routes to School and Safe Routes to Transit programs in Solano County, including seeking funding from the federal Safe Streets and Roads for All grant program.

X. Transit

1. Protect funding levels for transit by opposing state funding source reduction without substitution of comparable revenue.
2. Support tax benefits and/or incentives for programs to promote use of shared mobility options.
3. In partnership with the affected agencies and local governments, seek additional strategies and funding of programs that benefit transit dependent riders (including older adults, people with disabilities, students, youth, veterans, and the economically disadvantaged), such as intercity paratransit operations, mobility management, microtransit, and other community-based programs.
4. Monitor efforts to change Federal requirements and regulations regarding the use of Federal transit funds for transit operations in rural, small, and large Urbanized Areas (UZAs).
5. Work with MTC to generate new regional transit revenues to support the ongoing operating and capital needs of transit services, including bus, ferry, and rail. (Objective #2)
6. Support implementation of MTC Blue Ribbon Task Force's 27 recommendations and 6 functional areas consistent with the recommendations identified in STA's Connected Mobility Plan.
7. Monitor implementation of requirements in the IJIA regarding agency safety plans for small, urbanized areas.
8. Support the use of Cap-and-Trade funds for improved or expanded transit service.
9. Support funding of discretionary programs, including but not limited to the Local and Regional Project Assistance Program, National Infrastructure Project Assistance (MEGA), the Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE), Infrastructure For Rebuilding America (INFRA), Bus and Bus Facilities, Low or No Emissions grants, Promoting Resilient Operations for Transformative Efficient and Cost Saving Transportation (PROTECT), Reconnecting Communities, Safe Streets and Roads for All and Strengthening Mobility and Revolutionizing Transportation (SMART) grant programs.

10. Support funding for public transportation at the levels authorized in the IIJA and reauthorization of federal transit programs at the level to support public transit needs.
11. Support administrative policy modification to the commercial vehicle safety inspection code of public transit buses by California Highway Patrol while buses are in revenue service. Support streamlined inspections to ensure passenger and operator safety.

XI. Travel Demand Management (TDM)/Microtransit

1. Support TDM related legislation and policy at the regional and state level that provides qualified Commuter Carpools and Vanpools with incentives to encourage and promote clean air initiatives and ridesharing.
2. Promote innovative programs and projects to fill commuter first/last mile gaps, microtransit, and Safe Routes to Transit.
3. Support income tax benefits or incentives that encourage use of alternative fuel vehicles, vanpools, carpools, and public transit without reducing existing transportation or air quality funding levels.

XII. Movement of Goods

1. Monitor and participate in implementation of national, state, and regional freight plans that include construction of the I-80/I-680/SR 12 Interchange and SR 12 improvements, and Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) deployment and zero-emission freight.
2. Monitor and support initiatives that augment planning and funding for the movement of goods via maritime-related transportation, including the dredging of channels, port locations and freight shipment. Support the development of workforce development incentives, training, and education funding for the logistics, freight, and maritime industries.
3. Support efforts, including the use of dredging, to mitigate the impacts of additional maritime goods movement on surface transportation facilities.
4. Monitor and support initiatives that augment planning and funding for the movement of goods via aviation, rail, ports, and truck.
5. Monitor proposals to co-locate freight and/or passenger air facilities at Travis Air Force Base (TAFB), improve access to North and South Gate, and to ensure that adequate highway and surface street access is provided if such facilities are located at TAFB.
6. Support research into clean vessels and vehicle fuels, including the zero-emission of freight.

Legislative Update

The Legislature will reconvene on January 5, 2026, for the start of the second year of the two-year session. Any two-year bills introduced in 2025 that are still in their first house (House of Origin) will need to be heard in policy committees by January 16, 2026, and passed out of their House of Origin by January 31, 2026. For bills newly introduced in 2026, the last day to submit bill requests to the Office of Legislative Counsel is January 23, 2026, and the deadline for bill introductions is February 20, 2026. Update on CalSTA Transit Transformation Task Force Report

On December 9, 2025, the California State Transportation Agency publicly released the [Transit Transformation Task Force Report](#). The public release of the report followed CalSTA's submittal of the report to Task Force members and the Legislature on December 2, 2025 – more than a month after the October 31, 2025 submittal deadline established under Senate Bill 125 (Committee on Budget and Fiscal Review) [Chapter 54, Statutes of 2023].

While drafted by CalSTA, the report was informed by the Transit Transformation Task Force, which was convened by CalSTA in December 2023 to solicit and develop recommendations to grow transit ridership and improve the transit experience for all transit riders. As we have previously reported, the Task Force was comprised of 25 members, representing state government, local agencies, academic institutions, advocacy organizations, and other stakeholders. The report includes a detailed analysis of the services provided by California transit operators, transit ridership demographics, existing transit funding sources, and their eligible uses, the cost to maintain and operate the public transit network, the cost of federal and state mandates, workforce recruitment and retention, state and local policies that impact service efficiency, transit performance measures and oversight, and advances detailed recommendations on a wide range of topics.

The transit industry's participation in the Task Force process was principally steered by the California Transit Association (of which STA is a member). The Association was represented on the Task Force by 12 members across California. The Association convened a Transit Transformation Advisory Committee, comprised of the transit agency members of the Task Force, which met regularly over the past two years

to review Task Force proposals and develop industry recommendations for the Task Force's consideration.

The Board should be aware that the reception to the report from the Association – and likely, other industry stakeholders – is already mixed.

The Association has found that the Task Force report establishes a comprehensive landscape analysis of the challenges transit operators face, including the regulatory, administrative, and policy barriers that impede more effective transit project and service delivery; the external factors, like housing costs, land use decision-making, and remote work, impacting transit ridership; the external drivers of operational cost increases, like wages, insurance, and fuel; and the significant financial impacts of transit operators' efforts to comply with the California Air Resources Board's Innovative Clean Transit regulation, which mandates that operators transition their bus fleets to dramatically more expensive zero-emission technologies without dedicated new funding support. The Association has also found that the Task Force report appropriately outlines the near-term funding crisis faced by transit operators due to the continued prevalence of remote work, persistent inflation, and the state's mandated transition to zero-emission technology; the risk to once-stable transit funding sources, like the State Transit Assistance program, which relies on the sales tax on diesel fuel; and the potential cascading impacts of revenue losses on transit operators' financial stability.

The Association has shared, however, that the report's recommendations are likely to be of varied benefit to transit operators and their riders. The Association has commended the report for its recommendations on several topics, including transit safety and security, transit prioritization, first-mile / last-mile connections to transit, land-use, transit fleet and asset management, and construction. The Association has voiced concerns, however, about the limited recommendations on state transit funding, which largely focus on repurposing existing funding and creating opportunities for ancillary revenue development, and not the creation of new revenue sources; and, the limited recommendations on Transportation Development Act reform, which fall short of presenting a full replacement for the existing oversight mechanisms and performance measures.

The Association officially [memorialized its response](#) to the Task Force report in a letter to the Legislature on December 12, 2025.

Legislative Analyst's Office Budget Projection

In mid-November, the Legislative Analyst's Office released its [annual report](#) for the upcoming budget year, projecting a \$18 billion budget deficit for the 2026-27 fiscal year. This initial formal assessment of the state's financial health signals another tough year for state and local programs. The deficit is about \$5 billion larger than the administration's June estimate, despite revenue improvements. This is due to constitutional spending rules under Proposition 98 (1988) and Proposition 2 (2014), which nearly offset revenue gains. In their report, the LAO recommends that the Legislature address the budget problem through a combination of ongoing solutions—namely, achievable spending reductions and/or revenue increases. The deadline for the Governor to submit his proposed budget is January 10, 2026. It is worth noting that the Administration's fiscal projections often significantly differ from the LAO's.

Cap-and-Invest Program Auction Results

On November 26, the California Air Resources Board announced the results of the November 19 auction for Cap-and-Invest Program allowances. This auction, the first since the Cap-and-Invest Program was reauthorized in [AB 1207 \(Irwin\) \[Chapter 117, Statutes of 2025\]](#), produced \$840 million for the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund (GGRF), roughly \$150 million less than last year's November auction.

As a reminder, the legislation extending this program effectively established priority tiers for the GGRF appropriations outlined in the Cap-and-Invest Expenditure Plan. Off the top, the legislation appropriates GGRF revenue for a variety of backfills and administrative expenses – “Tier 1.” The legislation then appropriates \$1 billion in GGRF revenue for high-speed rail and \$1 billion in GGRF revenue for the Legislature’s discretionary priorities – “Tier 2.” Then, the legislation appropriates nearly \$2 billion for the historic continuous appropriations, including the Transit and Intercity Rail Capital Program (TIRCP), Low Carbon Transit Operations Program (LCTOP), and Affordable Housing and Sustainable Communities Program (AHSCP) – “Tier 3.”

Importantly, if Cap-and-Trade doesn’t raise enough GGRF to fund Tier 1 and Tier 2 programs at the levels prescribed, the funds for “Tier 3” programs will be decreased proportionally. In explicit terms, if Cap-and-Trade fails to bring in \$4.2 billion in proceeds, the TIRCP, LCTOP, and AHSCP will receive less than the \$400 million, \$200 million, and \$800 million committed to the programs, respectively.

CEC 2025-26 Investment Plan Update for the Clean Transportation Program

On November 24, the California Energy Commission published the [2025-2026 Investment Plan Update for the Clean Transportation Program](#).

The plan guides allocation of program funding for Fiscal Year 2025-2026 and the reallocation of funds from previous fiscal years, totaling \$364.9 million, to support the deployment of charging and refueling infrastructure for zero-emission vehicles.

The CEC will review the proposed allocations of program funding annually and will consider approving the plan at its December 8 business meeting.

New HVIP Funding Availability

The California Air Resources Board announced that the Clean Truck and Bus Voucher Incentive Project was reopened as of 9:00 am on December 16, 2025. HVIP has started to accept voucher request applications on a first come first serve basis. CARB has indicated that there is approximately \$95 million for Standard HVIP (\$5 million of these funds are for public fleets and tribal governments), \$25 million to the Public Transit Bus Set-Aside, and \$5 million to ISEF.

Re: December Report

In December, Akin monitored developments in Washington, including the appropriations process, the federal government shutdown, and funding opportunities. We also spoke with STA staff regarding STA priorities in they year ahead.

Fiscal Year 2026 Appropriations

Congress is working to finalize nine remaining FY 2026 appropriations bills before the January 30 funding deadline, following a 43-day shutdown that ended with a short-term funding patch. So far, only three of the twelve annual bills have been enacted, leaving major decisions unresolved on spending for departments including Transportation, Housing and Urban Development, Education, Commerce, Labor, Health and Human Services, Justice, Interior, and Housing and Urban Development. Senate leaders had hoped to advance a five-bill “minibus” package in December, but objections stalled progress. House Appropriations Chair Tom Cole is now pushing a plan to move three compromise bills per week in January. House Republicans (R-OK) are considering packaging the Commerce-Justice-Science, Energy-Water, and Interior-Environment bills in the first package and the Defense, Labor-HHS-Education and Transportation-HUD measures in the second package. Congress then would be left to pass the Financial Services, Homeland Security and State-Foreign Operations bills, which will be most contentious. If Congress does pass the appropriations bills by the January 30 deadline, it risks a partial government shutdown or extending current law through the fiscal year.

Department of Transportation Update

On November 26, the DOT [announced](#) \$1.5 billion in funding for the FY 2026 Better Utilizing Investments to Leverage Development (BUILD) grant program. The program funds projects that will have a significant local or regional impact and improve transportation infrastructure. Transportation authorities are eligible to apply, and DOT anticipates issuing 100 grants, each capped at \$25 million. Applications are due by February 24, 2026. The Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) updates the priority criteria to: safety, quality of life, mobility and community connectivity, and economic competitiveness. In addition to the priority criteria, sustainability will remain a criterion for consideration, along with state of good repair, partnership and collaboration, and innovation. Although merit criteria are written into law,

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presidential administrations typically adjust the factors and benefits they will consider under the individual criteria. Changes include the following:

- Safety-- increased emphasis on projects that implement autonomous systems; eliminate at-grade crossings; and facilitate separation of freight and passenger traffic.
- Environmental Sustainability -- shifts the focus to improved resilience to withstand extreme weather events and natural disasters as well as redundant alternative routes.
- Mobility and Community Connectivity -- includes benefits like enhanced capacity; additional options for intermodal and multimodal freight shippers; and a multimodal approach to last-mile freight delivery.
- Economic Competitiveness and Opportunity—highlights projects that advance the domestic energy sector and domestic maritime industries; improve intermodal and multimodal freight mobility; and address freight bottlenecks.

The NOFO further states that the Secretary may prioritize projects that: (1) can begin construction within 18 months of selection; or (2) are located in a designated Qualified Opportunity Zone (primarily low-income rural and urban communities – the full list can be found here); or (3) have a higher percentage of non-federal funding committed to the project; or (4) have not received a previous BUILD, RAISE, or TIGER grant.

On December 4, the DOT Office of Intergovernmental Affairs held its monthly meeting for stakeholders. The DOT participants announced the following funding opportunities and updates:

- Safe Streets for All Program: DOT expects to announce FY 2025 awards in December 2025.
- Federal Transit Administration All Stations Accessibility Program: In December, the FTA will publish \$686 million for this NOFO. Eligible activities include planning and capital projects on rail and public transit systems.
- Federal Transit Administration Transit Oriented Development Program: \$14 million for the pilot program is expected to be announced in Winter 2025/early 2026.
- Port Infrastructure Development Program: DOT plans to issue its FY 2026 Notice of Funding Opportunity (“NOFO”) in late December and announce FY 2025 awards in early 2026.

During the meeting, the Federal Railroad Administration’s (“FRA”) Deputy Administrator, Drew Feeley, discussed the National Railroad Partnership Program. The program funds capital projects

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that enhance rail safety, reduce state of good repair backlog, improve performance, expand, or establish new intercity passenger rail service. Feeley emphasized the program's new focus on safety, specifically regarding grade crossings. DOT issued a NOFO for this program on September 22, 2025. There is a total of \$5 billion available. Applications are due by February 6, 2025.

Congressional Update

On December 8, the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation convened a [hearing](#) to consider the below nominees:

- John DeLeeuw, Member of the National Transportation Safety Board
- Michael Graham, Member of the National Transportation Safety Board
- Richard Kloster, Member of the National Transportation Safety Board
- Ryan McCormack, Under Secretary of Transportation for Policy

A timeline for the full Senate consideration of these nominations has not yet been set.

Bills of Interest

On November 20, Rep. Jeff Hurd (R-CO) introduced [H.R.6168](#) in the House. The bill would redefine eligibility for airport-related TIFIA projects by expanding eligibility to include all projects that build or improve aviation facilities and equipment, removing the investment-grade rating requirement for airport projects, and raising the expedited-processing threshold to \$100 million in loan amounts, helping more mid-sized airport projects benefit from faster approval. Rep. John Garamendi (D-CA) cosponsored the bill. The bill was referred to the House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure.

On November 20, Rep. Timothy Kennedy (D-NY) introduced [H.R.6201](#) in the House. The bill would require the Administrator of the Federal Emergency Management Agency to administer the Next Generation Warning System grant program and disburse obligated funds to modernize public alerting systems to ensure timely, accessible emergency information. There are [6 cosponsors](#) for the bill. The bill was referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, and in addition to the Committee on Homeland Security.

On December 4, Rep. Mark DeSaulnier (D-CA) introduced [H.R.6435](#) in the House. The bill would establish additional requirements for certain transportation projects with estimated costs of \$2.5 billion or more. The bill text is not yet publicly available. Rep. Doug LaMalfa (R-CA)

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cosponsored the bill. The bill was referred to the House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure.

On December 4, Rep. Rick Larsen (D-WA) introduced [H.R.6451](#) in the House. The bill would direct the Secretary of Transportation to establish a pilot program for grants to improve access to public transportation services for veterans. There are no cosponsors of the bill. The bill was referred to the House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure.

On December 9, Rep. Timothy Kennedy (D-NY) introduced [H.R.6507](#) in the House. The bill would amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 and certain other laws relating to FEMA grant programs for preparedness, transit security, and port security to improve oversight, transparency, and stakeholder engagement in the administration of the programs. Rep. Bennie Thompson (D-MS) cosponsored the bill. The bill was referred to the House Committee on Homeland Security, and in addition to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure.

On December 12, Rep. Greg Stanton (D-AZ) introduced [H.R.6701](#) in the House. The bill would provide emergency relief for repair and reconstruction of infrastructure damaged by extreme heat. Rep. Michael Lawler (R-NY) cosponsored the bill. The bill was referred to the House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure.

Background:

The STA is annually required by the local government code 103 and the public utilities code 132354.1 to undergo an audit of its financial statement in accordance with Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB). The annual audit for FY 2024-25 is STA's 10th Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR), a financial report presented in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, basic financial statements and related notes, additional supplementary information which includes management discussion and analyses, introductory section, statistical information, supplemental fund and pension information.

In March 2022, STA entered into a three-year audit service agreement with an option for two (2) 1-year extensions with Maze and Associates, a Certified Public Accountant (CPA) firm from Pleasant Hill, California to perform the STA's annual financial reviews and funding compliance, appraise STA's accounting internal controls, and issue an Annual Comprehensive Financial Report (ACFR).

Discussion:

In October 2025, Maze and Associates performed their annual financial review, funding compliance, and internal controls audit for STA. Their audit evaluation resulted in an audit process on matters involving internal control over financial reporting and its operation to be considered of any material weaknesses, which resulted in their issuance of an unmodified (clean) opinion on STA's comprehensive financial statements for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2025. With the unqualified opinion of the FY 2024-25 annual audit and the 10th year issuance of the ACFR, STA now has twenty (20) consecutive fiscal years of no reportable deficiencies or material weakness that will adversely affect its primary missions.

In FY 2023-24, STA received its 9th recognition award from the Government Officers Finance Association (GFOA). STA's accounting and finance staff are seeking to submit for consideration for this award for its FY 2024-25 ACFR. Therefore, as required by GFOA, the STA's ACFR will be posted on the STA's website: www.sta.ca.gov.

Background:

At the recommendation of 2025 STA Board Chairperson, Mitch Mashburn, the STA Board formed a subcommittee to discuss the Solano Express service hours, fiscal challenges and service changes proposed by the SolTrans 2025 Comprehensive Operation Analysis (COA). Mayor Alma Hernandez, Mayor Andrea Sorce, Mayor Steve Bird and Mayor John Carli agreed to participate on the subcommittee with Mayor Hernandez appointed to Chair the subcommittee meetings.

The subcommittee met two times in December with the first meeting held on December 10, 2025 and the second follow up meeting held on December 18, 2025. The first meeting included the committee members and the Executive Director of SolTrans and the Deputy Executive Director of the STA. The purpose of the first meeting was to begin a conversation on areas of agreement between the two agencies with regards to both agencies and to begin working towards a recommendation for implementation. The second meeting included the same participants; plus, additional staff from SolTrans, STA and transit operators from City of Vacaville and City of Dixon were invited to attend as well.

The two topics agendized for the second meeting included:

- 1) Solano Express Blue Line Service Options to UC Davis Memorial Union
- 2) STA Decision Making Process for the Solano Express service

The subcommittee spent the majority of the second meeting focusing on agenda topic number one and agreed to discuss agenda topic number two at a future date. As a result, the subcommittee discussed three options considered for Solano Express service to UC Davis Memorial Union. After an extensive discussion, the subcommittee directed staff to explore impacts for each of three options with consideration of sentiments expressed by the committee members. Attachment A are meeting notes from the 2nd subcommittee meeting.

Discussion:

At their January 5th meeting, the STA Board's Executive Committee requested STA staff evaluate the three options and provide their analysis and recommendations to the full January STA Board. Attachment B includes that analysis and STA staff responses to the subcommittee's meeting notes as shown in red italics. In addition, STA staff made minor corrections to the original committee notes.

Based on the analysis of the three Solano Express service options, STA staff recommends moving forward with a revised Solano Express service Option 3 which would transition the Blue Line east of Fairfield to a pilot vanpool shuttle based on the following cost savings:

- Discontinuation of Route 82- \$230k in annual savings
- Blue Line service transition to vanpool shuttle east of Fairfield- \$420k in annual savings
- Phasing out Solano Express Guaranteed Ride Program- \$150k in annual savings
- Postpone Solano Express ridership survey- \$200k in one time savings
- Additional STAF savings from transitioning local Lyft program for:
 - STA's STAF contribution to the City of Benicia- \$80k in annual savings
 - STA's STAF contribution to the City of Vallejo- \$27k in annual savings

The recommended pilot vanpool shuttle service connecting from Fairfield, Vacaville, and Dixon to UC Davis will result in over \$600k in savings per year by reducing revenue service hours from \$230 to \$130 cost per hour. This saving combined with additional savings from the reduction of mobility programs would result in over \$800 to \$1 million in total savings annually. This combined total anticipated savings would address the estimated Solano Express service deficit in 2027-28 and allow for a vanpool shuttle service directly to UC Davis Memorial Union.

Fiscal Impact:

STA staff's recommendation will result in a savings of \$800k to \$1 million and would address the subcommittee's request to connect to the UC Davis Memorial Union while addressing the Solano Express service deficit anticipated in FY 2027-28.

Recommendation:

Approve a revised Solano Express subcommittee Option 3 to transition the Solano Express Blue Line to a pilot vanpool shuttle service in FY 2026-27 based on the cost savings identified in the discussion section of the report.

Funding Options Discussed

In addition, the STA survey is a one-time cost saving and is a requirement of the intercity funding and cost sharing agreement and is more comprehensive than SolTran's COA survey. This option would increase Solano Express service cost and service hours.

Option 2- Do not move forward with the Soltrans COA Solano Express service recommendations at this time in order to continue discussing funding and service options for the Solano Express Service. SolTrans staff insists that this is not an option since their Board approved the COA before the STA Board approved it.

STA staff recognize SolTrans desire for moving forward with their COA service changes in August 2026 which would necessitate a STA Board action at their January 2026 meeting. STA staff recommend a revised Option 3, which includes a pilot vanpool shuttle service to the UC Davis Memorial Union and addressing anticipated Solano Express service funding deficit in FY 2027-28. MTC is scheduled to provide funding estimates in February for STAF and TDA and STA staff will provide a more detailed assessment of funding availability at the March STA Board meeting.

Option 3- Further explore other potential funding options that result in addressing anticipated Solano Express service budget deficit by 2027 **AND** meet STA and funding partners request to service UC Davis at the UC Davis Memorial Union. Options discussed were:

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- Utilize savings from Solano Express Guaranteed Ride- *STA recommends phasing out the program by July 2026 resulting in \$150k savings for the Blue Line service transition to vanpool shuttle service.*

The combined savings from reduction in cost per hour and the savings noted above is estimated to result in a total savings between \$800k to \$1 million. This service can be implemented by STA in August of this year.*

Additional notes on this item:

- The majority of the committee agreed to service to Davis, but committee members were divided in what options to evaluate with at least one member requesting that options should be heard before immediately being removed from consideration. *STA staff's recommendation maintains the service to Davis and provides a better and more reliable connection to the UC Davis Memorial Union. Furthermore, it results in service cost savings of between \$800k and \$1 million.*
- SolTrans has approved decisions regarding the Solano Express Service that the STA (and the funding partners on the STA Board) have not approved. SolTrans is in need of moving forward with their recommended COA service changes by January or their local routes will be heavily impacted. *STA staff's recommendation addresses SolTrans desire to implement service changes in August of this year while also addressing the service request of Vacaville and Dixon to connect to the Memorial Union in Davis. In addition, STA staff's recommendation addresses the anticipated Solano Express funding shortfall in FY 2027-2028*

Background:

The original Solano County Rideshare Program began as part of a statewide network of rideshare programs in the early 1990s, funded primarily by Caltrans to manage countywide and regional rideshare programs in Solano County, and to provide air quality improvements through trip reduction. In 2000, Solano Commuter Information was transferred from Solano County to STA and became Solano Napa Commuter Information a few years later. Today the Solano Mobility Employer Commuter Program provides commuter incentives to encourage sustainable mode shift for residents and employees in the county. Solano Mobility staff engages businesses, homeowner associations, community clubs, and organizations to promote commuter benefits.

Discussion:

STA's Solano Mobility provides commuter incentives and subsidies to residents and employees of Solano County through the ten countywide and two local programs as listed below:

Countywide Programs	
1.	Bucks for Bikes (B4B)
2.	Capitol Corridor + Lyft

A full description and update for each program active in the first quarter of FY 2025-26 is included as Attachment A. Program participation for the first quarter of FY 2025-26 is included in Attachment B.

This report was presented to the Solano County Intercity Transit Consortium and STA TAC at their meetings held December 16 and 17, 2025, respectively.

Outreach

During the first quarter of FY 2025-26, the STA Employer Commuter program and Solano Economic Development Corporation (EDC) staff tabled/attended 13 events reaching 194 commuters and businesses. The program continues outreach via the Solano Mobility website and social media. The Commuter Programs page was the third most viewed page on the Solano Mobility website (Monster Analytics). There were approximately 15,846 views of social media content (X, Facebook and Instagram) during the first quarter. STA continued marketing Solano Mobility Commuter Programs in print and other mediums. In partnership with Solano EDC, staff attended Chamber Mixers and business events to develop contacts with local businesses.

Performance Measures and Benchmarks

The efficiency and effectiveness of these programs are determined using the corresponding STA Connected Mobility Implementation Plan Guidelines, Performance Measures, & Benchmarks, which were approved and adopted by the STA Board on July 13, 2022. The plan is included in Attachment C. Using the performance measures, STA can determine the ongoing relevance, usability, adaptability, and sustainability of the mobility programs currently offered in Solano County. Specifically, the STA Connected Mobility Implementation Plan Guidelines, Performance Measures, & Benchmarks goals and objectives support the recommendations of the Metropolitan Transportation Commission's (MTC's) Blue Ribbon Transit Recovery Task Force. The program supports clean air goals and addresses transportation equity as well. STA Mobility staff has evaluated the programs to determine they meet the criteria as defined in the evaluation methodology.

Fiscal Impact:

STA's Solano Mobility Employer Commuter Program FY 2025-26 approved budget:

- Employer Commuter program - \$1,000,000 (includes First/Last Mile) (\$175,000 provided by Bay Area Air District, State Transit Assistance Funds)
- Equitable Access to Justice Pilot - \$50,000 (20% provided by Solano Superior Courts, 80% County TDA)
- Solano Mobility Express Vanpool Pilot - \$606,840 (\$50,000 provided by YSAQMD grant, State Transit Assistance Funds)
- SCC Falcon Flyer Program - \$400,000 (provided by Solano Community College District)
- Solano Express Guaranteed Ride Program - \$250,000 (provided by State Transit Assistance Funds)
- Traditional Vanpool - \$50,000 (State Transit Assistance Funds with \$500/van matching from MTC)
- Suisun Lyft Program - \$200,000 (The City of Suisun City)
- Benicia Lyft Program - \$80,000 (The City of Benicia)
- Miscellaneous Lyft Programs for the Cities of Benicia and Vallejo - \$30,000 (State Transit Assistance Funds)

STA's Solano Mobility Employer Commuter Program is currently staffed by two full-time and one part-time employee, and one Intern.

STA's Solano Mobility Employer Commuter Program is funded by: Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) program funds, Transportation Fund for Clean Air (TFCA) funds through the Bay Area Air District (BAAD), Clean Air Funds through the Yolo Solano Air Quality Management District (YSAQMD), Solano County Transportation Development Act (TDA) funds, State Transit Assistance Funds (STAF), an MTC Bike to Wherever Days Stipend, and the Capitol Corridor JPA Marketing Agreement.

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ATTACHMENT A

STA Countywide Commuter Programs, Employer Program, and Local Programs Summary

Countywide Commuter Programs

Bucks for Bikes (B4B) (Funded by Bay Area Air District)

The Bucks for Bikes program was implemented in 2003 to encourage Solano County residents to bike to work for all or a portion of their commute. Approved applicants can receive reimbursement for 60% of the cost of a new commuter bike and helmet up to \$300. Riders are encouraged to log their trips on the Commute Solano (Rideamigos) platform to earn additional incentives.

6 reimbursements for a total of \$1,599.17 were provided during the first quarter. See Attachments B.1 and B.2 for participation comparisons.

Capitol Corridor Lyft (CC+L) (Funded by Capitol Corridor JPA)

The Capitol Corridor + Lyft Program was designed to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by reducing the number of single occupancy vehicles on the road. For \$20, the Program provides participants with a 10-ride Amtrak pass plus free Solano County train station Lyft connections (up to \$25). Participants must be residents of or employed in Solano County, and new to Capitol Corridor for commuting. Participants can use this program up to 3 times.

31 passes for \$3,585.96 were purchased during the first quarter of FY 2024-25. Sixteen new commuters enrolled in the program in the first quarter, increasing the total enrollment to 157 participants since the start of the program in 2019. See Attachments B.1 and B.2 for fiscal year participation comparisons.

Commute Solano (Rideamigos) Online Platform (Bay Area Air District Funds)

The website platform provides access to Solano Mobility commuter programs, rideshare matching, trip planning, and e-incentives for alternative commutes. Commuters can connect with other employees in their networks. Platform users can log alternative transportation modes such as transit, ridesharing, active transportation, and teleworking to earn points and receive gift cards as a Commute Reward.

During the first quarter, 228 active commuters logged 5,600 alternative commute trips for 128,912.3 miles and an estimated savings of 39.3 tons of CO₂. 164 new users joined during the first quarter. See Attachment B.1 for fiscal year comparisons.

Equitable Access to Justice (County TDA, Solano Superior Courts)

In partnership with the Solano Superior Courts, the Equitable Access to Justice pilot program eliminates transportation as a barrier to court participation by providing 100% subsidized rides to court appointments for jurors and collaborative court participants.

The program provided 359 rides for \$10,495.64 during the first quarter.

First/Last Mile (FLM) (Bay Area Air District, State Transit Assistance Funds)

The First/Last Mile program provides 60% off subsidized Lyft rides (up to a maximum of \$20 per ride) to and from 12 Solano County transit hubs (Amtrak stations and Solano Express fixed stops) for Solano County employees and residents who have trouble connecting to transit for their work commute. Commuters qualifying for the low-income subsidy receive 80% off subsidized Lyft rides.

During the first quarter of this fiscal year, 35 commuters registered for the First/Last Mile program, increasing program registration to 1,909 commuters. See Attachments B.1 and B.2 for fiscal year comparisons. See Attachment B.3 for origin/destination ridership for the first quarter ridership data throughout the program.

Guaranteed Ride Home (GRH) (State Transit Assistance Funds)

The Guaranteed Ride Home (GRH) Program supports Solano County residents and employees who commute by reimbursing the cost of a ride home (up to \$100) if an unexpected emergency arises. Program participants may use taxi, Uber, or Lyft for their ride home. To participate in the program, commuters must live or work in Solano County. Participants who commute into Solano County for employment must live within 100 miles of Solano County. Participants can use the program no more than three times per calendar month, and no more than six times during a calendar year. All Commute Solano members are registered for the program.

4 commuters received GRH reimbursements for \$249.18 during the first quarter of this year. See Attachments B.1 and B.2 for fiscal year comparisons.

Solano Express 2-for-1 Incentive (State Transit Assistance Funds)

To encourage new ridership on the Solano Express bus lines, the STA initiated a 2-for-1 incentive in October 2021. Anyone working or living in Solano County is eligible to receive a Clipper Card valued at \$125 with the purchase of a monthly or daily pass.

There were two 2- for-1 incentives redeemed by Solano Express riders during the first quarter. See Attachments B.1 and B.2 for fiscal year comparisons.

Solano Express Guaranteed Ride (GR) (State Transit Assistance Funds)

The Guaranteed Ride program was initiated in September 2022, to increase equity and accessibility for those who cannot afford to pay for their ride and wait for reimbursement under the GRH program. GRH provides an Uber Voucher option for Solano Express riders with a route cancellation, acting as insurance to maintain Solano Express ridership. Riders must register for the program at Commute Solano to receive an Uber Voucher valid for 4 rides each month.

During the first quarter of this fiscal year, 26 Solano Express Riders registered to receive Uber Vouchers. During the first quarter 1,622 rides were provided for \$82,445.71. See Attachments B.1 and B.2 for fiscal year comparisons. See attachment B.5 for rides, cost,

number of riders.

Traditional Vanpool Program (VP) (State Transit Assistance Funds with \$500/van matching from MTC)

STA's Solano Mobility provides a \$200 per month subsidy for two years to new, qualifying, traditional vanpools through Commute with Enterprise. This subsidy adds to the Metropolitan Transportation Commission's (MTC's) \$500 subsidy for a total of \$700 per month to help offset the cost of new vanpools.

STA subsidized 16 vanpools in July, 16 vanpools in August and 17 in September for \$9,800 in subsidies. 1 new vanpool was added to the STA subsidy in the first quarter. The number of STA subsidized vanpools decreases as vans reach the two-year subsidy limit. See Attachments B.1 and B.2 for vanpool comparisons (note the number of vanpools at the end of the year is noted in the chart, rather than the total subsidized for the year). During the first quarter, 69 Commute with Enterprise vanpools traveled to, from or through Solano County (see attachment B.9).

Vehicle Share (State Transit Assistance Funds with Capital Funds from Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation)

In November 2018 the Solano County Board of Supervisors approved an intergovernmental agreement with Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation for \$1,000,000 to implement five projects to improve the health and well-being of Solano County residents. One of the projects was to improve transportation options for non-ambulatory low-income older adults and people with disabilities to access medical appointments, social services, and other activities. \$100,000 was allocated to partner with Solano Transportation Authority (STA) to purchase two wheelchair-accessible vans unveiled to the public in June 2019 for the Vehicle Share Program. The Vehicle Share Program allows vehicles to be shared amongst multiple non-profits, the public, or any other 501(c)(3) organization that provides services for older adults and people with disabilities in Solano County. Since the unveiling, eight Community Based Organizations (CBOs)/Non-profit organizations have used the vans to transport their clients. In addition, the STA and City of Suisun City have used the vehicles to transport students and ADA eligible riders on an emergency basis when a microtransit vehicle was inoperable.

Regional/Countywide Transit Programs

Solano Mobility Express Vanpool Program (State Transit Assistance Funds and YSAQMD Grant)

This program provides a replacement option for Solano Express Blue Line riders traveling between Vacaville, Dixon and Sacramento during commute hours. 4 vans travel to and from Sacramento each day. The introductory rate is no more than \$50/month. Solano Express Blue Line riders transfer for free.

1,025 rides were provided during the first quarter. There were no missed runs this quarter. 9,562 rides were provided from the beginning of the program to the end of the first quarter. See Attachment B.4 for first quarter ridership data.

Solano Community College Falcon Flyer (Solano Community College)

In November of 2024 the Solano Community College District (SCCD) asked STA to partner in piloting an Intercampus Vanpool Program to connect the Vacaville, Fairfield, and Vallejo campuses to meet a critical need and one of the major initiatives of the college's three-year Student Equity and Achievement Plan. This initiative assists students with transportation challenges, allowing them to stay engaged and graduate in a timely manner by providing access to courses at campuses outside their home location. In addition, the vanpool facilitates student access to essential resources and participation in extra-curricular activities across campuses. The program launched April 14, 2025.

During the first quarter, the Falcon Flyer vanpool program provided 758 rides for up to 68 unique riders.

Pursuant to an asset purchase agreement between SHARE Mobility and Pro Park, LLC, dated May 31, 2025, SHARE Mobility has requested STA's consent to assignment and acknowledgement of assigned contracts for the Solano Mobility Express Vanpool and Solano Community College District Intercampus Vanpool Pilot Programs. The SHARE Mobility management team serving the vanpool program are now employed by Pro Park, the company currently providing the drivers for the vanpool program. Contracting directly with Propark will help to curtail program costs. This change is effective January 1, 2026.

Local Transit Replacement Programs

Benicia Lyft (The City of Benicia)

The program (started in 2019 to provide a replacement option for the Benicia Dial-a-Ride program) provides subsidized Lyft rides throughout the city of Benicia and to the Springtowne Center in Vallejo for qualified Benicia residents. To qualify, Benicia residents must be veterans with a military or veterans ID; disabled with an ADA card, RTC card, Medicare card or DMV placard; or 65 years old or older. The cost is \$4 one-way, or \$3 one-way for individuals qualified for the low-income fare. To qualify for the low-income fare individuals must be a part of a Solano County program like Medi-Cal, Cal Fresh, Cal Works, SSI, etc., or on PG&E CARE/FERA. Residents must contact the Call Center to sign up.

Customers must have a smart phone and be ambulatory to use Lyft for the Dial-a-Ride replacement program. If not, they are provided with the Veteran's Cab number after registration. Customers are informed that this service is in addition to the SolTrans (Benicia) paratransit service that continues to take qualified individuals within $\frac{3}{4}$ mile of the SolTrans fixed route service (including trips between Benicia and Vallejo).

The \$5 Benicia Lyft Program (started in 2021) provides Lyft rides within the City of Benicia for \$5 (up to \$20) and can be accessed by entering the code 5Benicia in Lyft apps. There is no signup required. The program is open to residents and visitors.

During the first quarter, the Benicia Lyft, and \$5 Benicia Lyft programs provided 3,195 rides for \$27,666.88. See attachment B.6 for fiscal year comparisons.

Benicia residents are also able to travel from Benicia City Park and the Benicia Bus Hub to Gateway Plaza in Vallejo by entering STGATEWAYPLAZA in their Lyft app.

Suisun Lyft (The City of Suisun City)

The Suisun City \$2 Lyft program (started in 2021) provides one-way Lyft rides for residents traveling within Suisun City. Residents enter SUISUN2 in their Lyft app.

The Suisun City \$3 Lyft program (started in 2021) provides one-way Lyft rides for residents traveling to 5 locations in Fairfield: Sutter Health, North Bay Medical Center, Kaiser Clinic, Ole Health Clinic, and the Fairfield Transportation Center. Residents enter SUISUN3 in their Lyft app. In January 2025, the Suisun City Council approved the addition of Rush Ranch to the geofence for the Suisun City \$3 Lyft program.

Residents who qualify for the low-income fare (must be a part of a Solano County program like Medi-Cal, Cal Fresh, Cal Works, SSI, etc., or on PG&E CARE/FERA) can travel one-way within Suisun City and to the 5 Fairfield locations for \$1.50. Residents must contact the Call Center to sign up for the low-income fare.

During the first quarter, 5,725 Suisun City Lyft rides for \$53,513.96 were provided. See attachment B.7 for fiscal year comparisons.

Miscellaneous Lyft Programs for the Cities of Benicia and Vallejo (State Transit Assistance Funds)

The Vallejo/Benicia Lyft programs (started in 2019) provide subsidized one-way Lyft rides for residents traveling to/from 9 locations in Vallejo and Benicia. Riders pay 20% of Lyft fares plus the difference in fares over \$20. Designated locations: Vallejo Transit Center to/from Carquinez Mobile Home Park, Vallejo Ferry Center to/from Carquinez Mobile Home Park, Vallejo Transit Center to/from Cal Maritime Academy, Vallejo Ferry Terminal to/from Cal Maritime Academy, Benicia City Park to/from Gateway Plaza, Benicia Bus Hub to/from Gateway Plaza, Vallejo Transit Center to/from Mare Island, and Vallejo Ferry Terminal to/from Mare Island. There is no signup required. The program is open to residents and visitors.

During the first quarter, 662 Vallejo/Benicia Lyft rides were provided for \$6,800.36. See attachment B.8.

Employer Program (Bay Area Air District)

To consolidate Solano Mobility commuter programs and services, the Employer Program was created in October 2017. The Program informs Solano County employers about the benefits and services available to assist their employees with their commutes. Solano EDC continues

to partner with Solano Mobility to promote STA's commuter benefits via direct mail, social media and in person events.

During the first quarter, Solano EDC attended 12 chamber/business events speaking with 73 employers. The EDC also presented Solano Mobility programs to local businesses during Business Retention and Expansion visits.

Solano Community College (SCC) Transportation Fee (Solano Community College)

In 2016, Solano Community College students passed a measure providing reduced transit fares through a transportation fee. In April of 2019, the student body voted overwhelmingly to continue the transportation fee for the next decade. SCC students can ride the bus for in and within Solano County. Currently, FREE rides are provided on Solano Express, FAST, SolTrans, and Vacaville City Coach for Solano Community College students showing their IDs. The program was also expanded to allow students to access all Solano Express stops, even those outside the county.

Each of the transit operators is directly reimbursed for the cost. The current distribution is 42.5% for SolTrans and the City of Fairfield, and 15% for the City of Vacaville. \$1,204,749 has been disbursed to the transit operators since FY 2017-18. In May of 2025, the City of Fairfield and SolTrans both received \$73,805.54, and the City of Vacaville received \$26,049.02.

STA Connected Mobility Implementation Plan Guidelines, Performance Measures, & Benchmarks Goals and Objectives

Solano Mobility Vanpool Program: The program should sustain 90% of its existing vanpools annually, grow at least five vanpools per year, and be managed, funded, operated, marketed, priced, and evaluated in adherence to industrywide best practices.

Solano Mobility's Vanpooling is oriented to provide transportation to work services to individuals who live at least 15 miles from their workplaces. To ensure its effectiveness, the program must be administered in a way that aligns with the industrywide standards generally recognized as encouraging success. Currently the program is partnered with Commute by Enterprise to provide outreach support and additional subsidies to Solano County employers. Key program aspects include:

- Ensuring broad service coverage with an established, consistent turnkey agreement process between STA and long-serving contractors and vendors.
- Establishing meeting structures that encourage collaboration and idea-sharing between contractors and vendors.
- Ensuring strategic oversight of program services and delivery and clear definition of agency and vendor responsibilities.
- Delivering consistent program administration with clear billing/invoicing, outreach, and customer service practices.
- Maintaining a single source of vanpooling information that is easily communicated, marketed, and promoted to customers, and that enhances public understandability of the program.
- Conducting incentive programs to encourage participation and use.
- Collecting program use data for performance monitoring purposes.

Solano Mobility Guaranteed Ride Home Program: The program should be accessible to all Solano County employees, should be administered in adherence to industrywide best practices, and should meet the quantifiable service goals listed below.

Solano Mobility's Guaranteed Ride Home program provides a free ride home from workplaces for individuals who do not drive alone to work, serving as a lifeline for transit and other mobility program commuters and enabling greater access to the mobility system in general. To ensure its effectiveness, the program must be administered in a way that aligns with the industrywide standards generally recognized as encouraging success. Key program aspects and service goals include:

- Allowing all permanent part-time or full-time employees who work to or from Solano County eligibility to participate.

- Defining the qualifying emergency situations during which registered employees can request service.
- Defining the alternative transportation modes that registered employees must have used on the day of requested service to qualify the Guaranteed Ride Home reimbursement.
- Defining the extents of the service, including the types of trips eligible for reimbursement, trip maximum distances from Solano County employment locations, eligible expenses, and both annual and per-trip reimbursement amount limits.
- Administering a clear and accessible registration process, with registration forms available for completion and submission both online and via mail.
- Responding to initial program applications within two business days of application receipt.
- Responding to initial request for guaranteed ride home reimbursement within two business days of request receipt.
- Processing reimbursements to riders within 45 days of receiving the guaranteed ride home request.

To ensure its effectiveness, the program is administered in a way that aligns with industrywide standards generally recognized as encouraging success. Key aspects include:

- Clearly defining participant eligibility, program requirements, and program policies and procedures.
- Requiring participants to provide feedback in three surveys at three-month intervals after receiving the incentive.
- Encouraging Commute Solano on the Ride Amigos platform.
- An increase in program participation with participants from each city in the county.
