#### **Background:**

The Solano Transportation Authority (STA) administers the Countywide Pedestrian Transportation Plan (STA Pedestrian Plan) that identifies and plans for the implementation of countywide pedestrian transportation projects. The STA supports and prioritizes for funding and for approval purposes pedestrian projects that are included in the STA Pedestrian Plan.

The STA Pedestrian Plan Priority Projects List is developed through a collaborative effort between the Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC), STA staff, and public works and planning staff from the member agencies. This creates a consistent foundation for the funding and delivery of projects in Solano County.

An annual review of the list will be conducted prior to the beginning of each new fiscal year to ensure that the list is up to date as projects are completed and priorities change at the local level.

The Proposed Pedestrian Plan Priority Projects comprehensive list will be updated every three to five years per the STA Pedestrian Plan. A proposed revision period will be scheduled for 2016.

### **Discussion:**

STA staff requests that the PAC finalize and approve a list of pedestrian priority projects consisting only of projects listed in the STA Pedestrian Plan. The PAC may designate as Tier 1 (highest priority) or Tier 2 (priority) projects and send a final list to the STA Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) and to the STA Board for approval.

- A. Proposed Pedestrian Plan Priority Projects List (comprehensive) from the 2012 STA Pedestrian Plan. Only projects from this list may be included in the fiscal year 2015/16 Pedestrian Plan Priority Projects List.

- C. April 2015 DRAFT Pedestrian Plan Priority Projects List, based on feedback received from responsive member agencies. All projects are listed in the 2012 STA Pedestrian Plan.

RE: PAC By-Laws Revision

#### **Background:**

The Solano Transportation Authority (STA) Trails Advisory Committee was created in 2002 to advise the STA and the County of Solano during the creation of the 2002 Countywide Trails Plan. The Trails Advisory Committee was absorbed by the Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC) in 2004, and the Countywide Trails Plan was subsequently replaced by the Countywide Pedestrian Transportation Plan in 2004.

The PAC formed with six additional special-interest organizations not included on the Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC): the Bay Area Ridge Trail Council; the San Francisco Bay Trail; the Solano Community College; the Solano County Agriculture Commission; the Solano Land Trust; and the Tri City and County Cooperative Planning Group (later changed to Solano Open Space). There are currently vacancies in all but one of these positions (Solano Community College), with one pending appointment to the Bay Area Ridge Trail Council.

Three organizations (San Francisco Bay Trail, Solano County Agriculture Commission/Solano County Agricultural Advisory Committee, and the Solano Land Trust) in 2014 requested to be removed from the STA PAC. Additionally, the Tri City and County Cooperative Planning Group has not been known to meet more recently than 2012.

#### Discussion:

STA staff proposes to revise the PAC by-laws to eliminate all six special-interest seats, maintain the one existing member-at-large, and add two additional members-at-large, changing the total membership from 15 member seats to 11 member seats. The currently appointed and pending special-interest members may assume the two new member-at-large positions if they so choose.

# SOLANO TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY PEDESTRIAN ADVISORY COMMITTEE BY-LAWS

#### ARTICLE I. NAME OF ORGANIZATION

The name of this organization shall be the Solano Transportation Authority Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC), hereafter called the PAC.

#### ARTICLE II. AUTHORIZING AGENCY

The Solano Transportation Authority (STA), as the Congestion Management Agency (CMA) of Solano County, authorizes the establishment of the PAC and shall approve all appointments to the PAC, the PAC by-laws, and all amendments to the PAC by-laws.

#### ARTICLE III. PURPOSE

# Section 1. Duties/Responsibilities

The PAC shall advise the STA on the development of pedestrian facilities as an active mode of transportation. The PAC may make recommendations for Solano Countywide Pedestrian Transportation Plan projects and participate in the development and review of comprehensive pedestrian plans. The PAC may also offer advice to and/or site jointly with the Bicycle Advisory Committee and/or the Safe Routes to School Committee.

# Section 2. Review Process

The PAC review process shall ensure that pedestrian projects within the Cities (Benicia, Dixon, Fairfield, Rio Vista, Suisun City, Vacaville, and Vallejo) and the County of Solano promote and encourage pedestrian use for: commuting, shopping, and other personal trips; reducing motor vehicle trips; reducing motor vehicle miles traveled; reducing motor vehicle congestion; increasing safety and access to transit; and promoting health and air quality benefits.

#### ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP

#### Section 1. Representation

The STA Board of Directors shall determine membership of the PAC and appointment requirements. The PAC shall include a representative from each of the seven (7) Cities (Benicia, Dixon, Fairfield, Rio Vista, Suisun City, Vacaville, and Vallejo), the County of Solano, and three (3) members-at-large for a total membership of eleven (11).

Members of the PAC shall be approved by majority vote of the STA Board of Directors. Preference should be given to non-elected citizens and who are not employed by member agencies. Representatives for the cities and the county shall be residents of those jurisdictions.

# Section 2. Voting Members

Voting privileges are vested exclusively in the PAC members or their alternates. Voting members of the PAC shall be the aforementioned 11 members representing the incorporated Cities, the County, and the community at large. Each member of the PAC shall have one (1) vote. However, an individual may be appointed to both the PAC and the Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC); in such a circumstance the Member shall have two votes when the committees meet together. If the Member is attending a meeting as the representative of one committee only (such as may occur for meetings of subcommittees or ad hoc committees) then the Member will have a single vote in that instance.

## Section 3. Appointments

Appointments to the PAC shall be derived from submitted STA PAC Nomination Statement of Interest Forms on file with STA staff with review and approval from the STA Board of Directors. To provide for staggered terms, each member shall serve for a period of up to three (3) years per term. The STA Board may appoint an alternate to serve in the primary member's absence.

# Section 4. Vacancies

If and when vacancies occur, they must be filled according to Article IV., Sections 1 and 3.

# Section 5. Role of STA Staff

The STA shall, under direction of the STA Board of Directors, provide staff and organizational support to the PAC.

#### ARTICLE V. OFFICERS

# Section 1. Elected Officers

The elected officers of the PAC shall be the Chair and Vice-Chair.

# Section 2. Election of Officers

The PAC shall, at the last meeting of each calendar year, nominate and elect the Chair and the Vice-Chair for one (1) calendar year term. No officer shall serve more than two (2) consecutive terms in a given office.

# Section 3. Role of Chair

The Chair shall preside over all PAC meetings, coordinate the meeting agenda with STA staff, represent the PAC's actions to appropriate agencies or designate a representative(s) to do so, and have general direction and control over the activities of the PAC.

# Section 4. Role of Vice-Chair

The Vice-Chair shall assist the Chair in the execution of the duties of the Chair office. In the absence of the Chair, the Vice-Chair shall preside over the meetings, and when so acting, shall have the duties of the Chair.

# Section 5. Vacancy in the Office of Chair

In the event of a vacancy in the office of Chair, the Vice-Chair shall be elevated to the office of Chair for the remainder of the calendar year term, and the PAC shall nominate and elect a new Vice-Chair. Any Vice Chair elevated due to a vacancy in the Chair is eligible to serve as Chair for a full term in addition to the remainder of the vacant term.

#### ARTICLE VI. MEETINGS

# Section 1. Meetings/Attendance

The PAC shall hold a regular meeting at least once a calendar year quarter and as necessary to fulfill the mandate of Article III, Sections 1 and 2. Members of the PAC that do not attend three scheduled meetings in succession and do not contact staff to indicate that they will not be present is considered to be an 'un-contacted absence' and may have their position declared vacant by the STA Board of Directors. Absence after contacting staff is considered a 'contacted absence.' Contacted absences and uncontacted absences shall be documented in the minutes of each meeting. If a PAC member has missed a combination of four contacted and un-contacted absences in any one-year period, he or she will be sent a written notice of intent to declare the position vacant. If there is no adequate response before or at the next scheduled meeting, and based upon a recommendation from the PAC, the position may be declared vacant by the STA Board.

### Section 2. Special Meetings

The PAC may convene special meetings as necessary to conduct its business.

#### Section 3. Public Process

All meetings shall be posted public meetings conducted in compliance with the Brown Act.

#### Section 4. Definition of a Quorum

A quorum shall consist of the majority of the then appointed PAC members of the Cities, the County, and the members at large.

#### Section 5. Actions

Actions of the PAC require a quorum and the majority vote of the voting members present.

## ARTICLE VII. SUBCOMMITTEES

The Chair may establish subcommittees or special task forces when they are deemed necessary to carry out the PAC's mandate.

#### ARTICLE VIII. PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The PAC shall use "Robert's Rules of Order" as a general guide for meeting procedures when they are consistent with the PAC by-laws. When applicable and consistent with STA Board policies, the PAC may use any rules of order the Committee may adopt.

#### ARTICLE IX. ADOPTION AND AMENDMENTS TO THE BYLAWS

#### Section 1. Adoption of the PAC By-laws

Adoption of the PAC by-laws will be by a majority vote of the STA Board of Directors.

# Section 2. Amendments to the PAC By-laws

The PAC may take action, by a two-thirds minimum vote, to propose amendments to the by-laws at any regular meeting of the PAC, provided that the amendment has been submitted in writing for the PAC to review prior to voting. Suggested amendments to the PAC by-laws shall be forwarded to the STA Board of Directors via the STA Technical Advisory Committee (TAC).

# Section 3. Approval of Amendments to PAC By-laws

Official amendments to the PAC by-laws will be by a majority vote of the STA Board of Directors.

#### ARTICLE X. PEDESTRIAN ADVISORY COMMITTEE LETTER WRITING POLICY

Letters written by the Pedestrian Advisory Committee that are directed outside the Authority must be reviewed by the Executive Director. If in the opinion of the STA Executive Director, the contents and intent of the letter is either non-controversial or is consistent with STA Board policies, the letter will be sent out. In all other cases the letter must be approved by STA Board action.

#### Introduction

The Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC) is responsible for updating and monitoring the progress of the Solano Countywide Transportation Pedestrian Plan and making funding recommendations for countywide pedestrian-related projects to the STA Board of Directors and member agencies.

### Scope of Work

a. Inventory the adoption of the countywide pedestrian plan or a local pedestrian plan for each jurisdiction in Solano County

ALTERNATIVE MODES ELEMENT PURPOSE STATEMENT: One County, Many Choices for Mobility – To establish programs and facilities for the transition toward sustainable transit-oriented communities with integrated multimodal transportation choices for Solano's residents, workers, and visitors. This will be accomplished by incorporating alternative modes as a central part of travel to ensure accessible, convenient, healthy, safe, efficient and cost-effective travel options to enhance connectivity, and will be compatible with local land use planning.

PEDESTRIAN ELEMENT PURPOSE STATEMENT: Making walking an everyday means of transportation and recreation in Solano County – To create a complete, safe, and enjoyable system of pedestrian routes and zones in the places people need and want to go in Solano County, providing a viable alternative to the use of the automobile, through connection to transit, and employment, health, commercial, recreational and social centers.

<u>GOALS</u>: Goals are the milestones by which achievement of the Purpose Statement are measured. In order to implement the Purpose of the Solano Countywide Pedestrian Plan, the following goals are/will be established:

- 2. Develop the Countywide Pedestrian Plan to serve as a pedestrian master plan or a foundation for local agencies to use in the development of a local pedestrian plan.
- 3. Build the pedestrian transportation network by planning, designing, funding, and constructing transportation facilities that will meet the needs of the walking public.
- 4. Improve pedestrian safety in Solano County.
- 5. Increase the use of walking as a viable alternative to the automobile.
- 6. Develop an integrated and coordinated transportation system that connects walking with other modes of transportation, which includes, but is not limited to, bicycling, driving, and taking public transportation.
- 7. Provide safe access for pedestrians to all points in Solano County
- 8. Develop a pedestrian network that connects to northern California's alternative modes system
- 9. Develop a standard countywide wayfinding signage system to connect pedestrians to park-and-ride lots, transit, water transportation, and other key local destinations (i.e. downtowns, farmer's markets/produce stands, local commerce and retail, etc.).

**OBJECTIVES:** Objectives are the actions by which achievement of the Goals are measured.

Identify the top 10 to 20 pedestrian transportation projects to be completed in the short-term (2010-2015), mid-term (2015-2020), and long-term (2020-2025), based on a variety of objective and subjective criteria, including (but not limited to) number of activity centers served, closure of critical gaps, immediate safety hazards, existing and potential pedestrian use, support from the public and local jurisdictions, and availability of funding.
- b. Develop detailed implementation information for each recommended segment, including approximate length or area covered, project type, adjacent traffic volumes and speeds, proximity to activity centers, cost, and overall feasibility.
- c. Develop education and maintenance programs that may be adopted by local jurisdictions.

→Goal #2: Develop the Countywide Pedestrian Plan to serve as a pedestrian master plan or a foundation for local agencies to use in the development of a local pedestrian plan.

## Objective 4 – Support local plans and actions

- a. Encourage local jurisdictions to make safe, convenient, enjoyable pedestrian access a priority in their policies, plan, and projects
- b. Encourage the use of the Pedestrian Plan as a toolkit to help local jurisdictions identify, document, support, and implement pedestrian-friendly projects, digital maps, policy background, guidelines, and funding information provided in the Plan.
- c. Encourage local jurisdictions to expand on the current projects and basic framework of pedestrian routes and places in this Plan to create their own comprehensive transportation plans
- d. Recognize and support pedestrian access and activity in existing zones and destinations such as downtowns, waterfronts, and historic districts

- e. Acknowledge and build upon the many current efforts to improve and create places within local jurisdictions that support pedestrian circulation and activity
- f. The highest priority pedestrian improvements should be those where pedestrian facilities are lacking or deficient in close proximity (1/4 to 1/2 mile) to pedestrian destinations such as schools, parks, transit, and shopping
- g. Coordinate planning for pedestrian improvements with planning for transit and regional parking centers
- h. Ensure that pedestrian improvements meet applicable standards for access to people with disabilities
- i. Coordinate with local schools from elementary to college level, to encourage and support walking, including preparation of Safe Routes to School studies, plans, programs, and projects.
- j. Encourage each local agency to collect and maintain data on pedestrian safety for reference in funding applications and future Pedestrian Plan updates.

- e. Encourage the coordination of pedestrian and health advocacy groups, such as health care providers and coalitions
- f. Prepare and distribute or post maps of pedestrian routes and districts, and general information promoting the opportunities and benefits of walking.
- g. Promote walking and awareness of the benefits of walking by supporting or coordinating with local events that feature walking or that occur in pedestrian-oriented areas

- Solano County: Farm to Market (Mankas Corner)

RE: Staff Updates

#### **Background:**

The Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC) often hears about an assortment of pedestrian related issues around the county and region. Some of these issues are of high importance and receive a portion of the agenda in the form of discussion items or presentations. Other issues are more appropriate to briefly report on in the form of updates. Below is a list of topics and brief updates.

### **Active Transportation Program (ATP)**

ATP is a statewide funding program that aims to build bike/ped facilities that will see people getting out of their cars and using active transportation more often. Approximately \$180 Million is available at the statewide level, and \$30 Million at the regional level. STA staff is working with the city and county staff in preparing the most competitive applications that will be submitted before the June 1, 2015 deadline. The applications coming out of Solano County agencies include:

Safe Route to School (bundle of multiple projects)
Suisun Valley – Mankas Corner
Vallejo – Bay Trail – Vine Trail
Fairfield – East Tabor Avenue

Suisun City – McCoy Creek Trail
Rio Vista – Bike/Ped Plan
Fairfield – Gateway to Transit Center

#### **Air District Funds**

The eastern side of the county is in the *Yolo-Solano Air Quality Management District*. Applications for their Clean Air Funds program were due March 27, 2015. Among applications were two pedestrian projects.

The western side of Solano County falls under the *Bay Area Air Quality Management District*. The funding programs are currently being updated. These updates are likely to include the eligibility of bike projects. STA staff supports this change and will look for competitive projects in Solano County. A call for projects for \$108,000 available to Solano County agencies in the Bay Area Air District will be released shortly.

### **Bay Trail – Vine Trail Study**

Two regional trail networks pass through Vallejo, so a feasibility study was done to look at alignment options that would be beneficial for everyone involved. The team of Alta Planning and Parisi Transportation were hired for this study. The study had multiple public meetings with Vallejo residents and many rounds of feedback from the standing STA committees. The plan was presented to the STA Board on April 15<sup>th</sup> and will go to Vallejo City Council at the end of April. The project will then seek funding.

#### Cap and Trade Funds – Fairfield-Vacaville Intermodal Station

Cap and Trade is a new funding source through the state of California. Under the Affordable Housing Sustainable Communities program, STA is supporting the City of Fairfield in applying for \$4.8 million for the intermodal station building, site improvements (include bike and ped access), and rerouting the local bus systems to better support the station and residents. The final round of applications consists of about 120 projects where about 40% will receive funding. The application was submitted on April 20, 2015. STA anticipates hearing results at the end of June.

#### **Background:**

The STA purchased in March 2015 eight portable automated counters (four tubular bicycle counters and four infrared pedestrian counters) for use by member agencies for a variety of purposes.

#### **Discussion**

#### A. Data collection

STA contacted all member agencies applying for Active Transportation Program (ATP) funds (applications due June 1, 2015) and offered the use of automated counters to collect data for use in applications.

Beginning April 9, 2015 and extending for two weeks, Suisun City is utilizing two bicycle counters and two pedestrian counters to collect data for ATP applications at the intersection of the Central County Bikeway and the McCoy Creek Path.

The STA plans to use automated counters to collect data for Safe Routes to Schools (SR2S) ATP applications for Benicia, Rio Vista, and Vallejo.

#### **B. Program Development**

The STA has created a user agreement and a user prioritization policy for the counters (see attachments).

The STA will be developing a bicycle and pedestrian volume count program for use in Solano County based on the following guidelines:

- Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) Traffic Monitoring Guide (2013); and
- National Cooperative Highway Research Program (NCHRP) REPORT 797:
   Guidebook on Pedestrian and Bicycle Volume Data Collection (2014).

# Solano Transportation Authority (STA) Automated Bicycle and Pedestrian Counter Site Selection Policy - DRAFT

The STA owns and operates eight portable automated counters (four tubular bicycle counters and four infrared pedestrian counters). The STA, Solano County, and the seven member cities within Solano County have priority over requests from outside agencies and stakeholders, in case of time or resource conflict.

The STA will prioritize requests to use automated counters to collect bicycle and/or pedestrian volume data based on the following criteria:

## **Priority 1: Grant Funding Opportunities (Applications).**

Proposed projects seeking competitive grant funds, including but not limited to grants from the Active Transportation Program (ATP), Bay Area Air Quality Management District (BAAQMD), and Yolo-Solano Air Quality Management District (YSAQMD).

### Priority 2: Before-Data (Funded Projects and Studies).

Projects with secured implementation-funding (grant or otherwise), and funded studies, for data collection prior to (potential) project implementation.

### **Priority 3: After-Data to Supplement Before-Data.**

Implemented projects that previously used automated counters to collect before-project volume data.

#### **Priority 4: Priority Projects.**

Planned projects that have been prioritized through: approved plans; by the STA Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC); by the STA Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC); within a Priority Conservation Area (PCA); and/or within a Priority Development Area (PDA).

### **Priority 5: All Other Projects and Purposes.**

Proposed projects under review by the STA Bicycle Advisory Committee (BAC) and by the STA Pedestrian Advisory Committee (PAC) in order to determine priority projects for planning and funding purposes. STA will also accept requests to use automated counters for purposes not described above, or for use by other jurisdictions such as a neighboring Congestion Management Agency (CMA), on a case-by-case basis.
